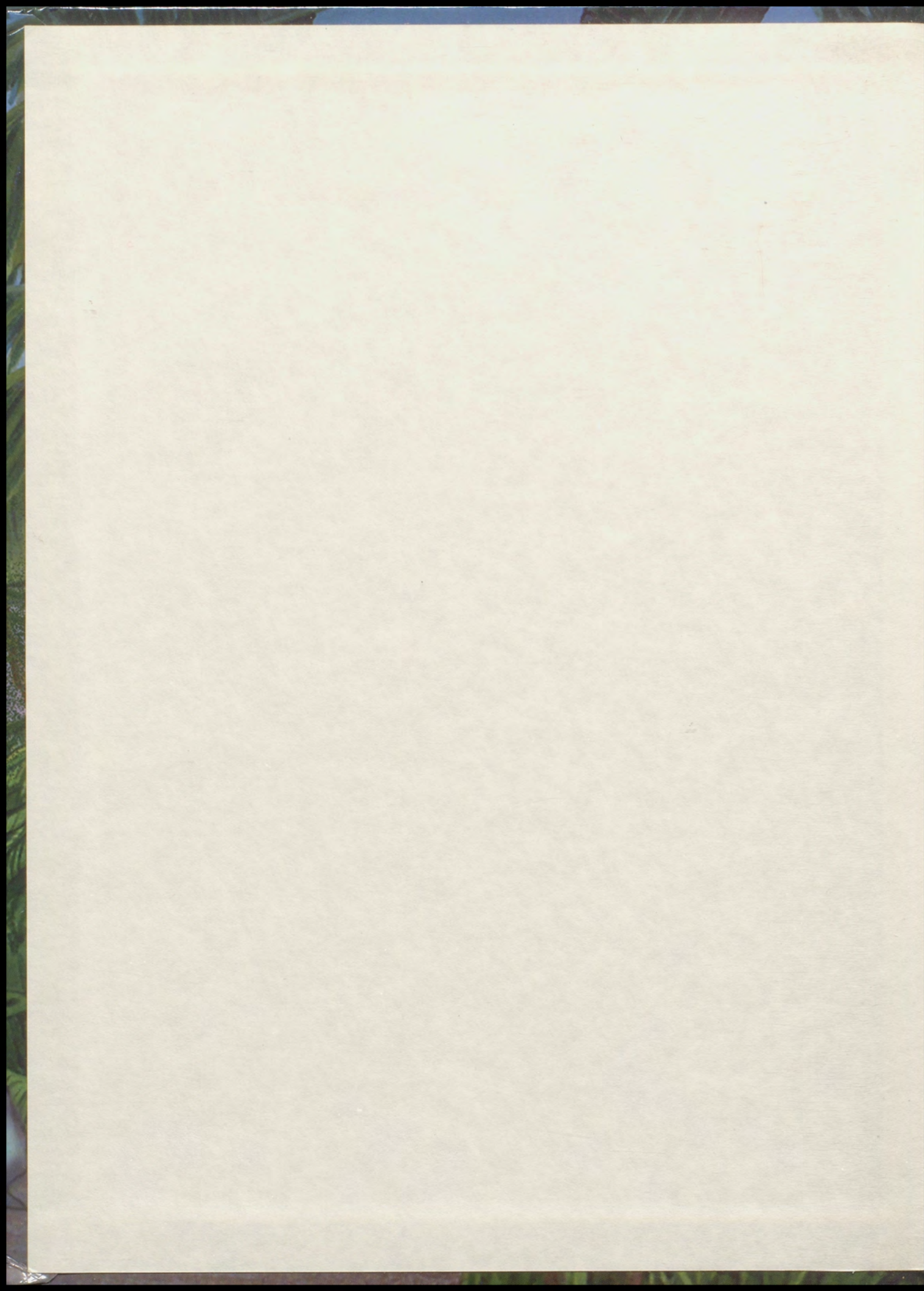
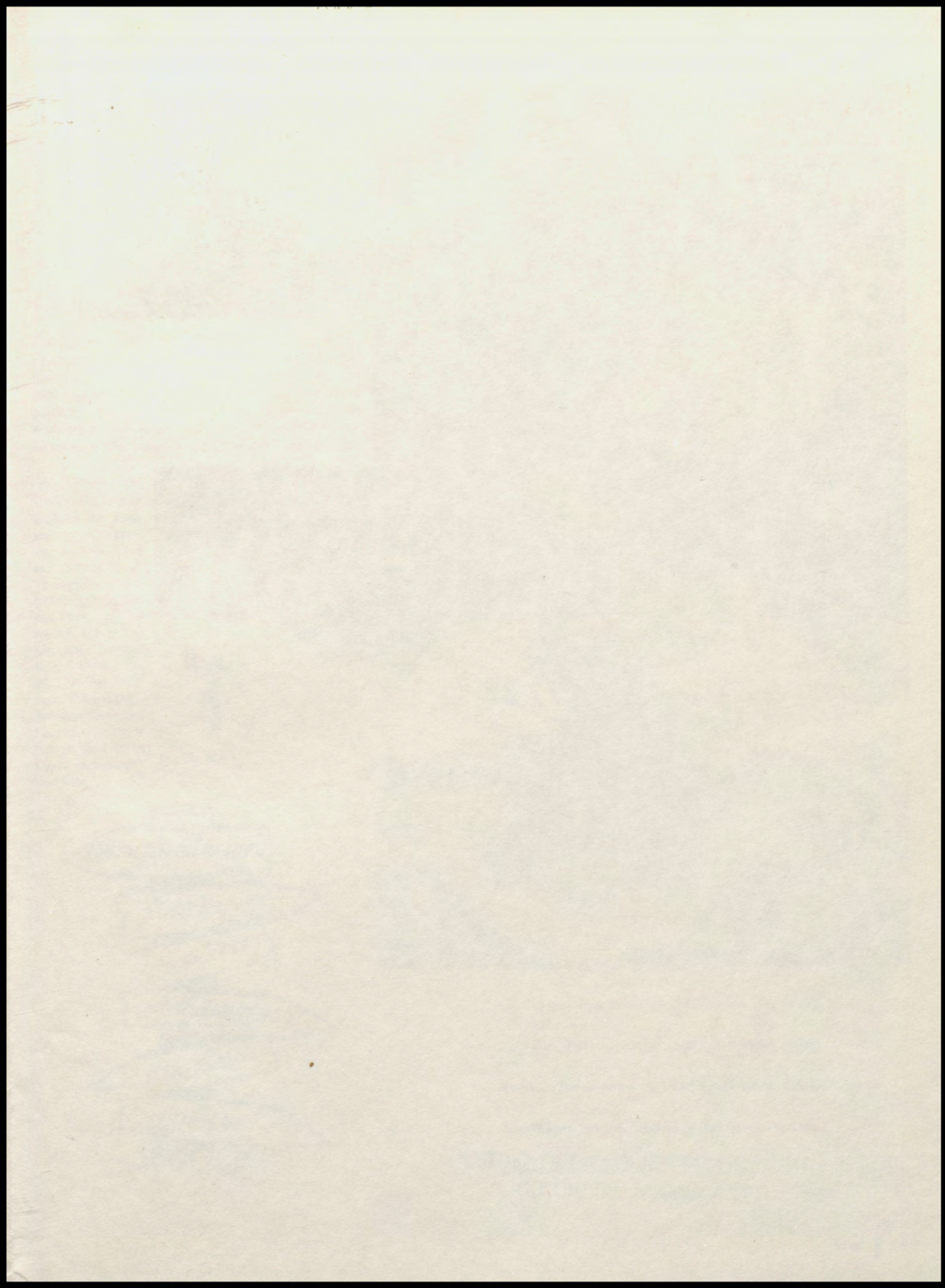
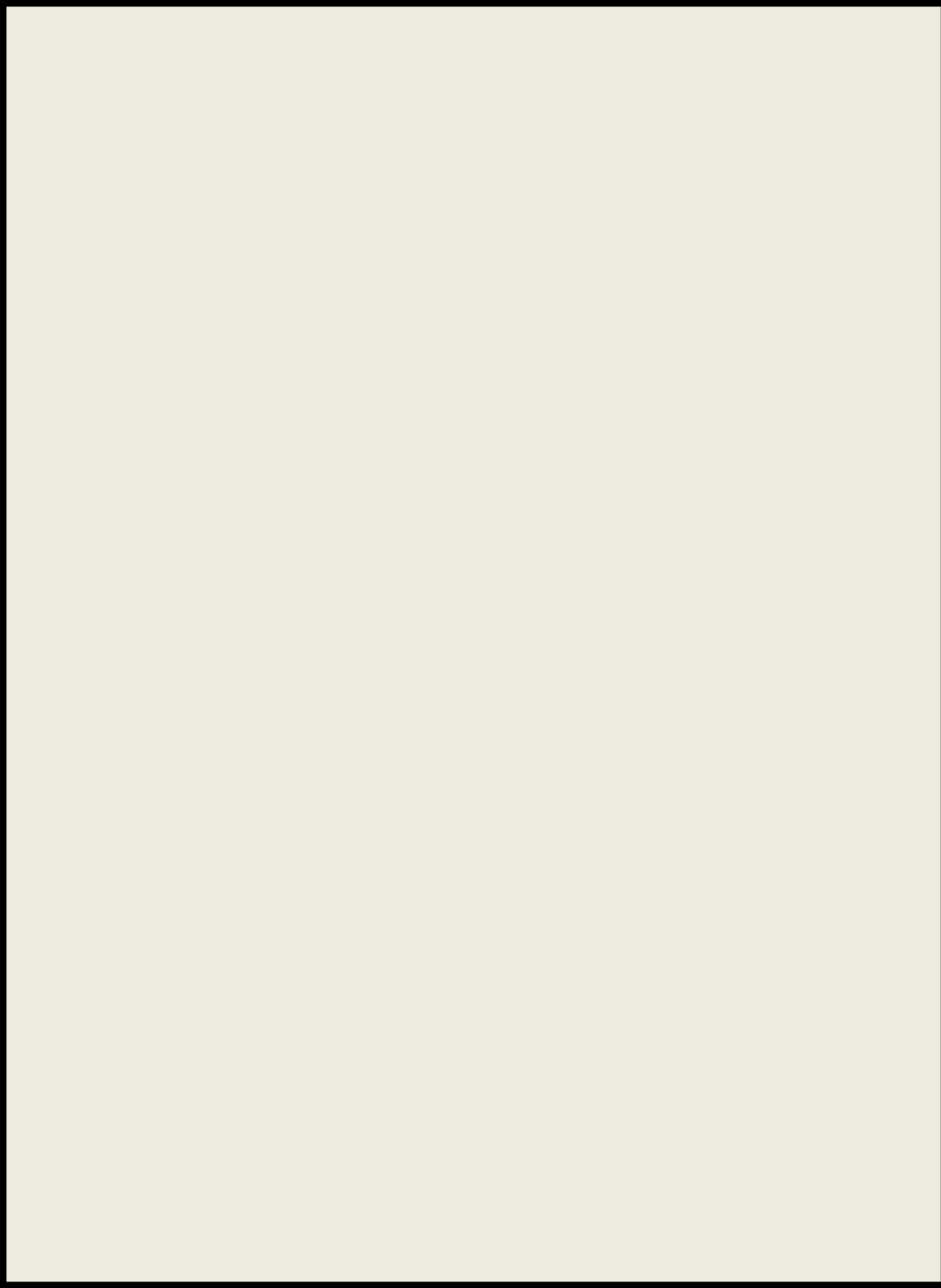

# The Quest has Begun

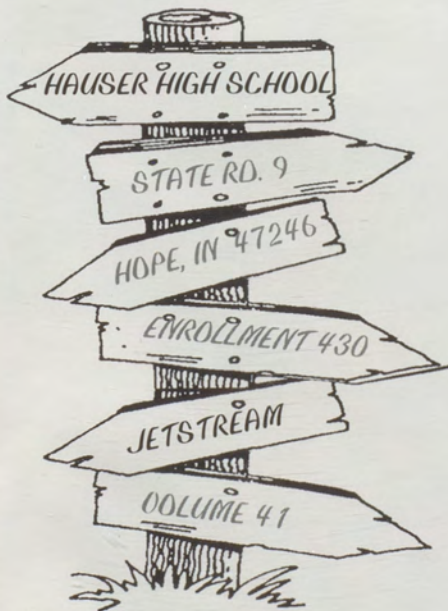

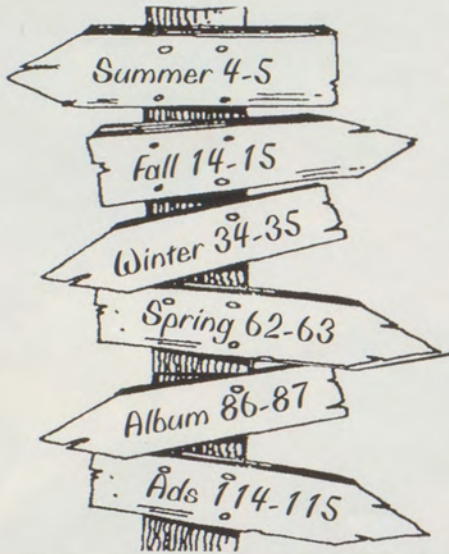
*Easy does it.* Junior Chris Bushy gently adds water to his

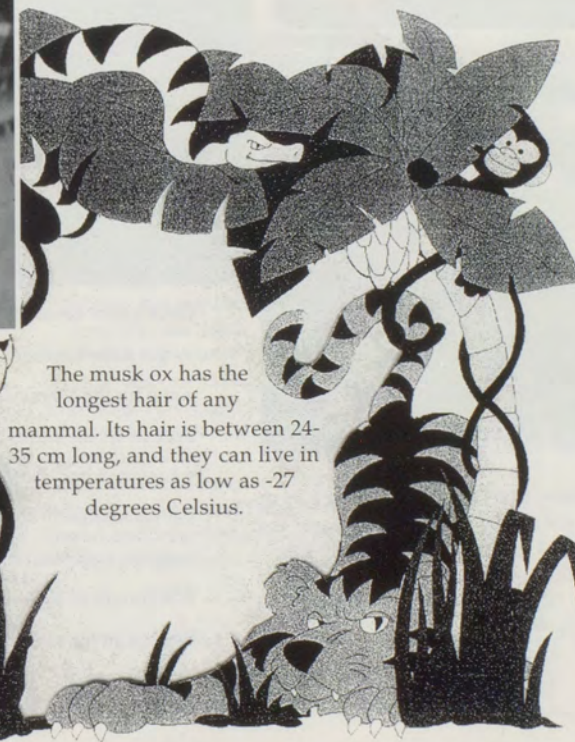
## Conquering the unexpected obstacles in life

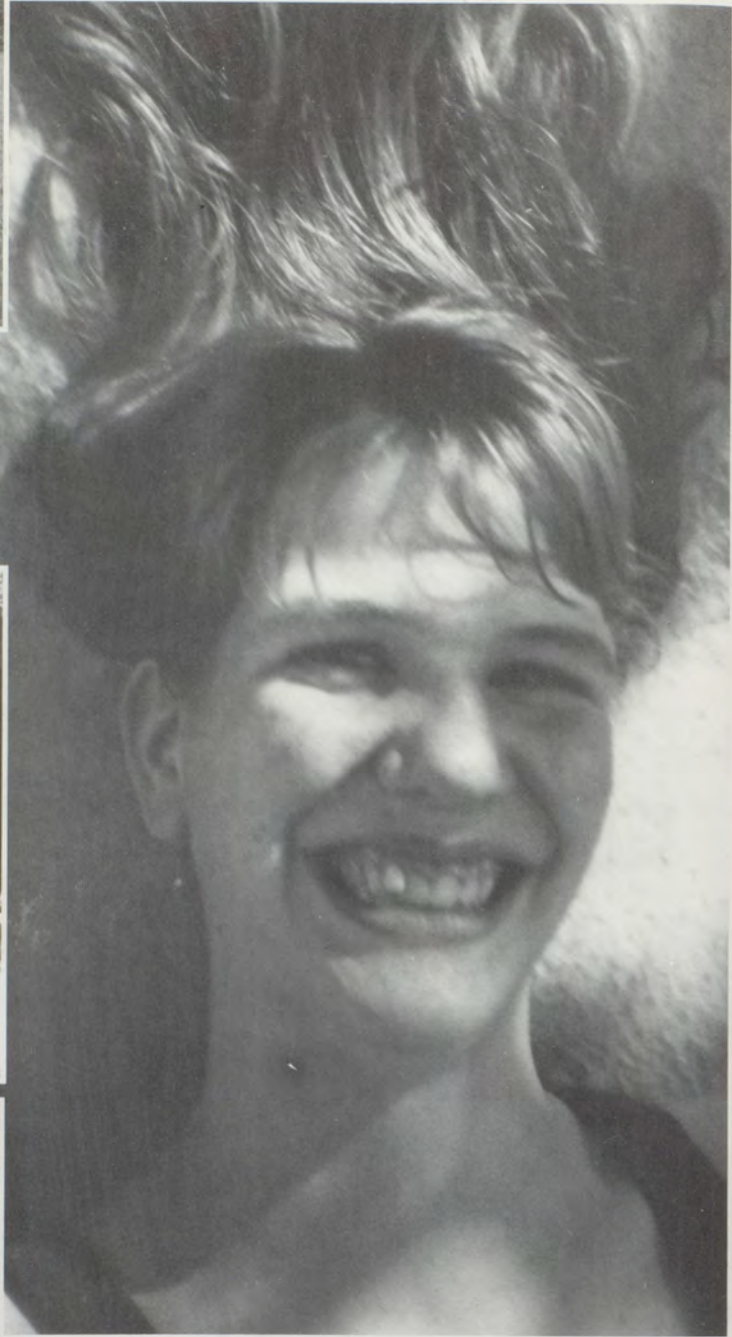

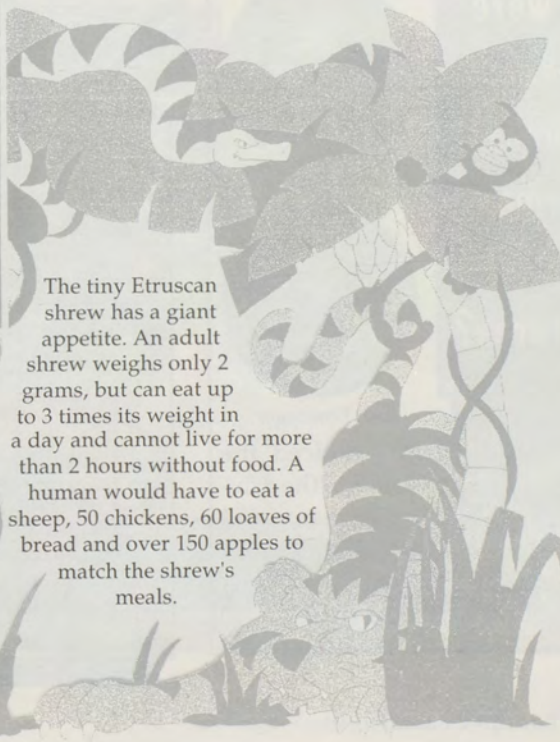
*Danger lurks behind bright and sunny summer days*

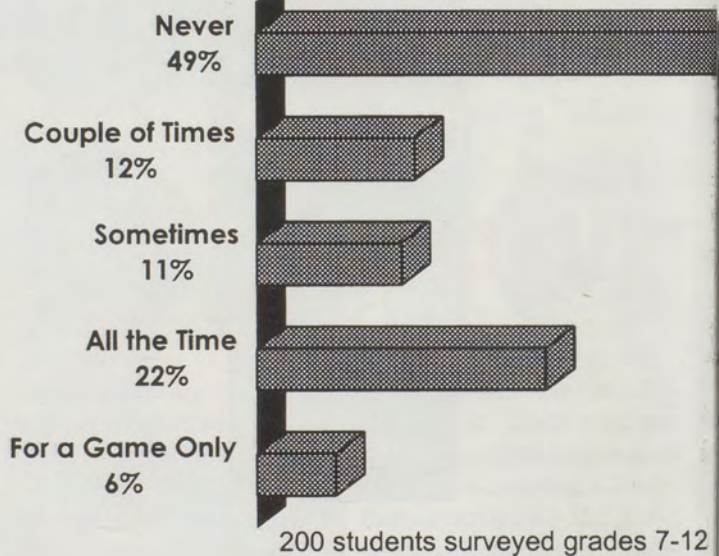

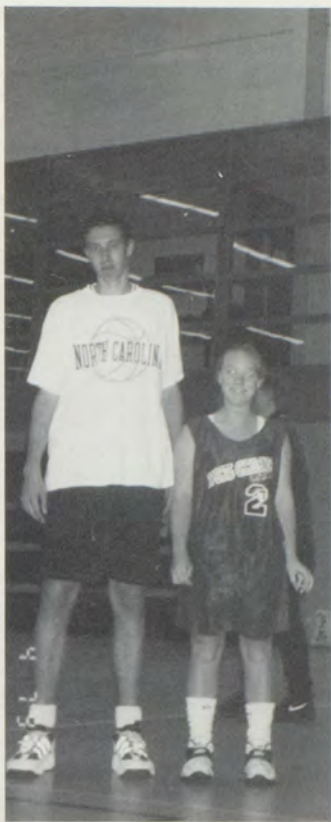

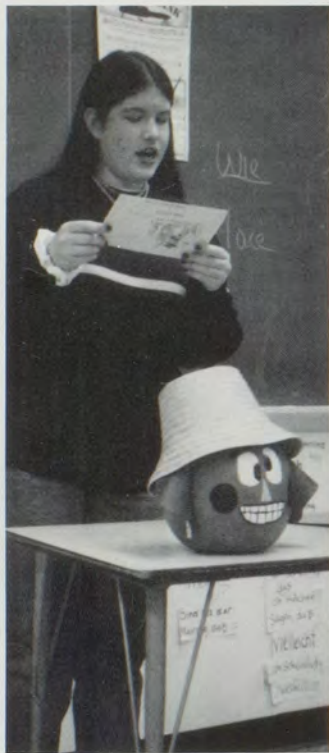

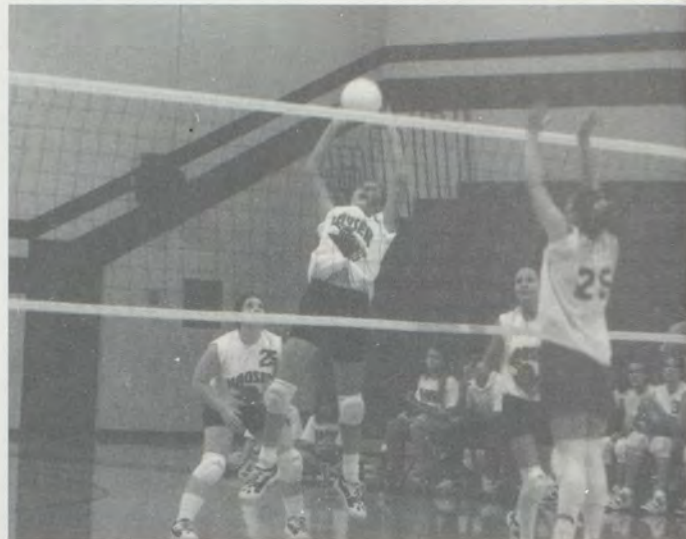

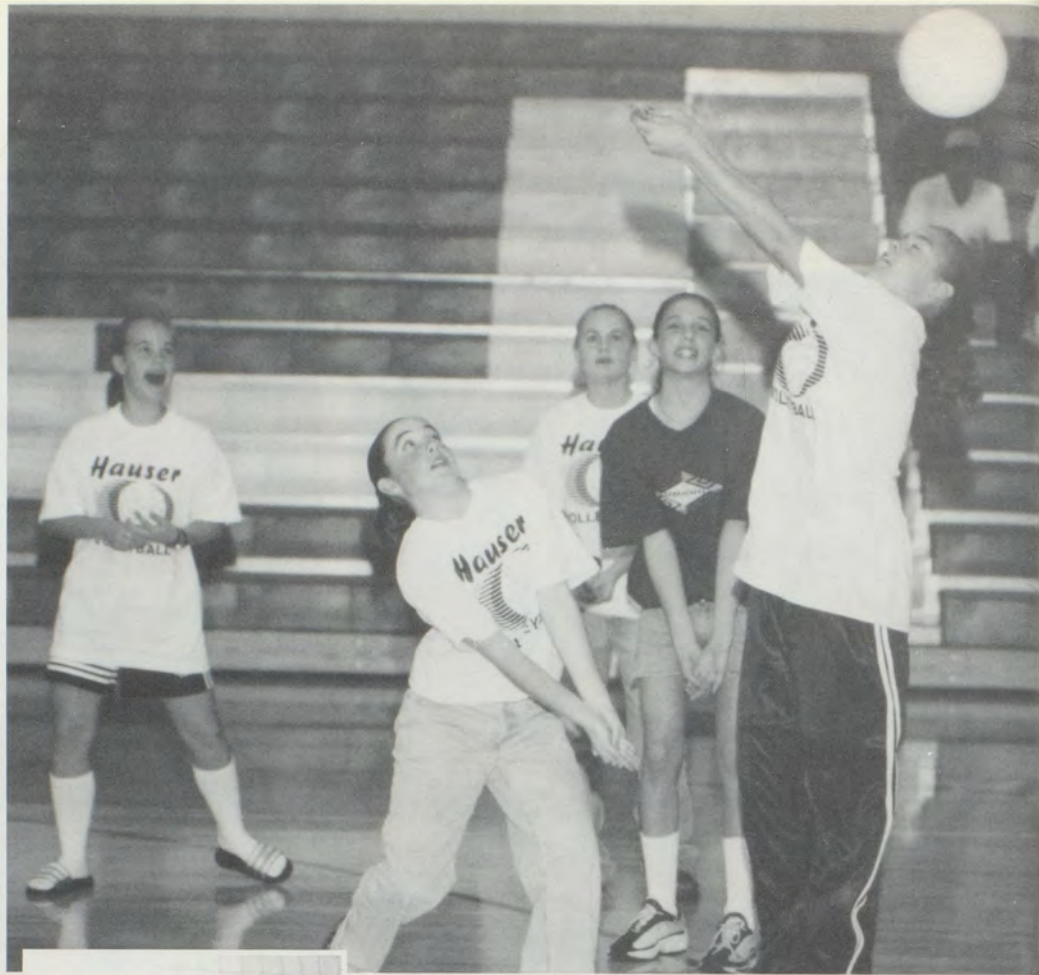

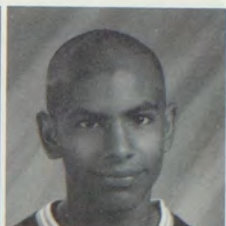

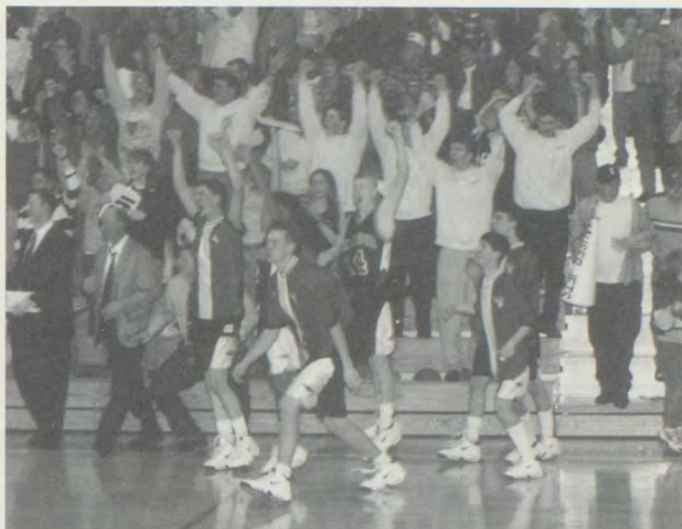

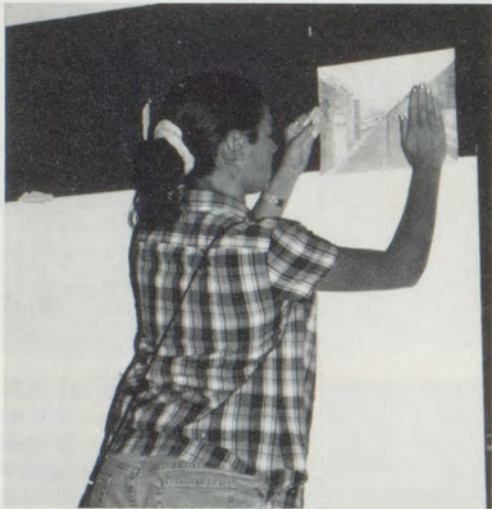

Spring is usually defined as a time of beginning, but for students spring means the end of the school year.

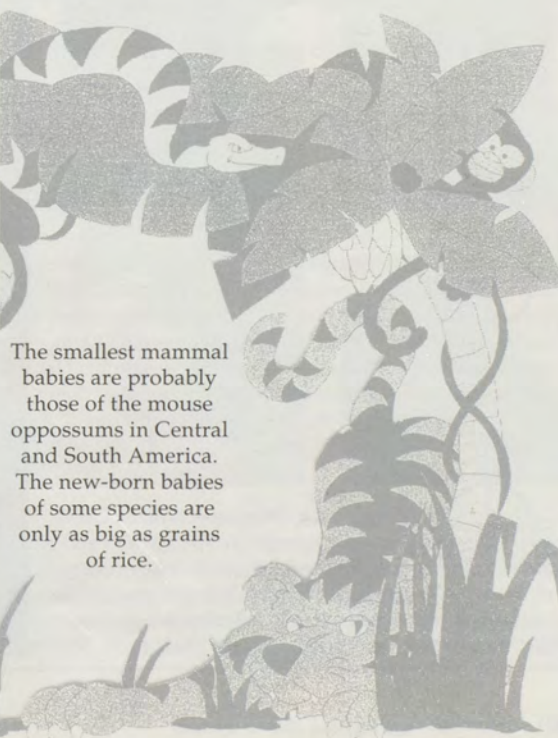

*what's the buzz?* ten points. The groups are beneficial in

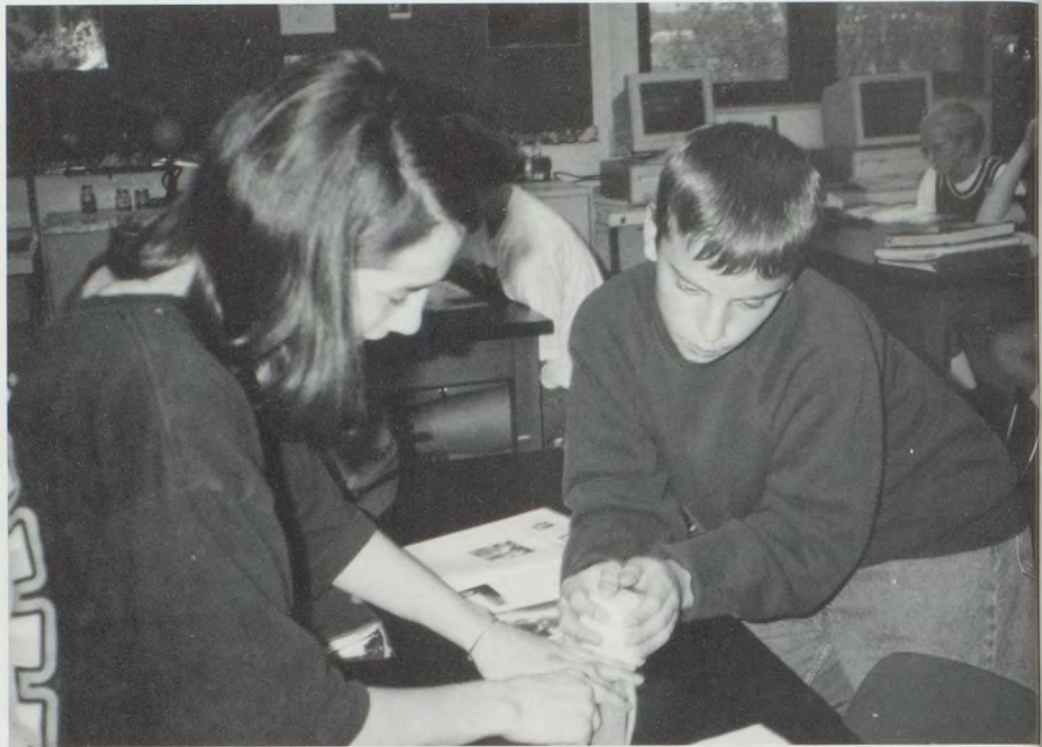
that they create positive peer pressure for the students.

## When Staying After Isn't Detention



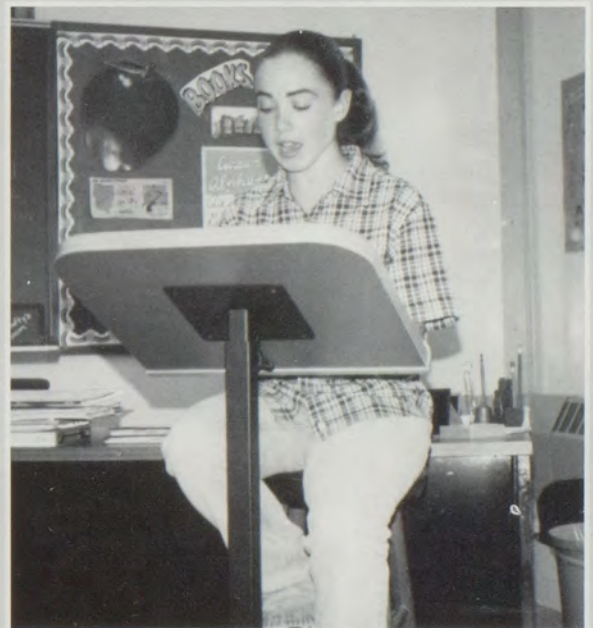

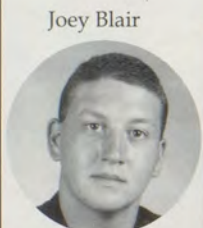

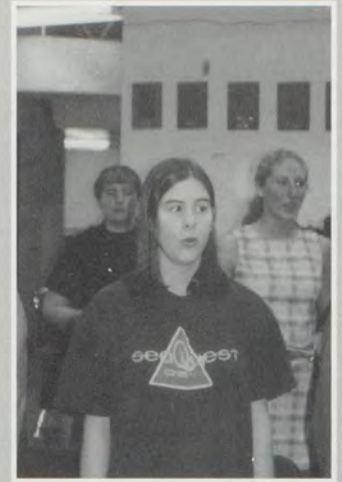

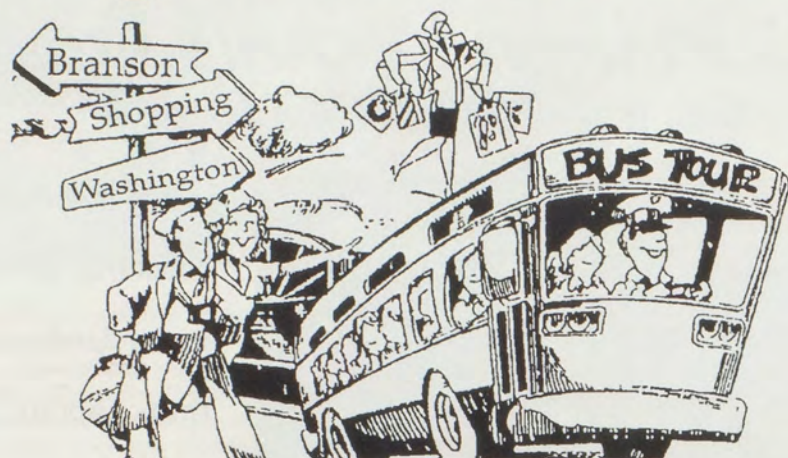

The cover was based on ideas generated by Jetstream staff members. Final design was completed by Josten's artists.

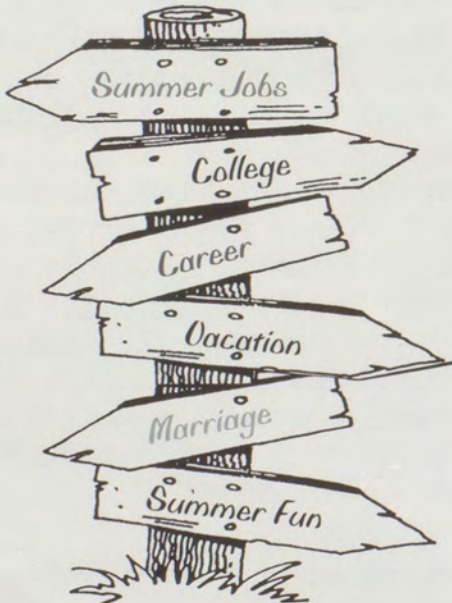
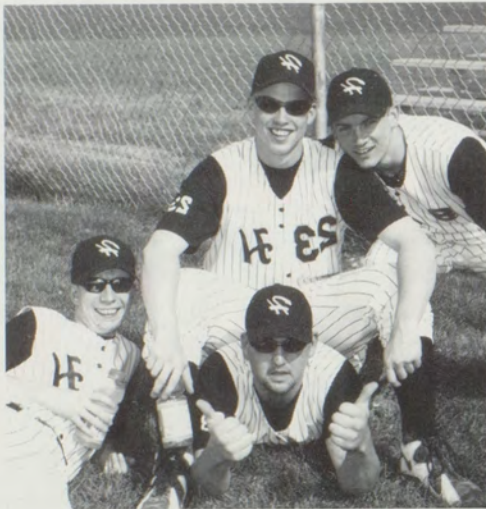
