Regardless of who you are, things will matter; the stuff you do, who with and how you relate, and the issues that make life more controversial.



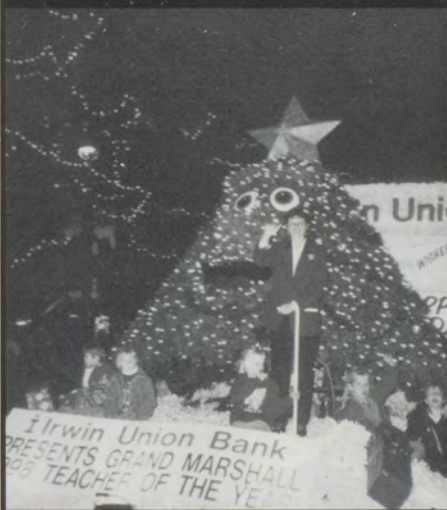

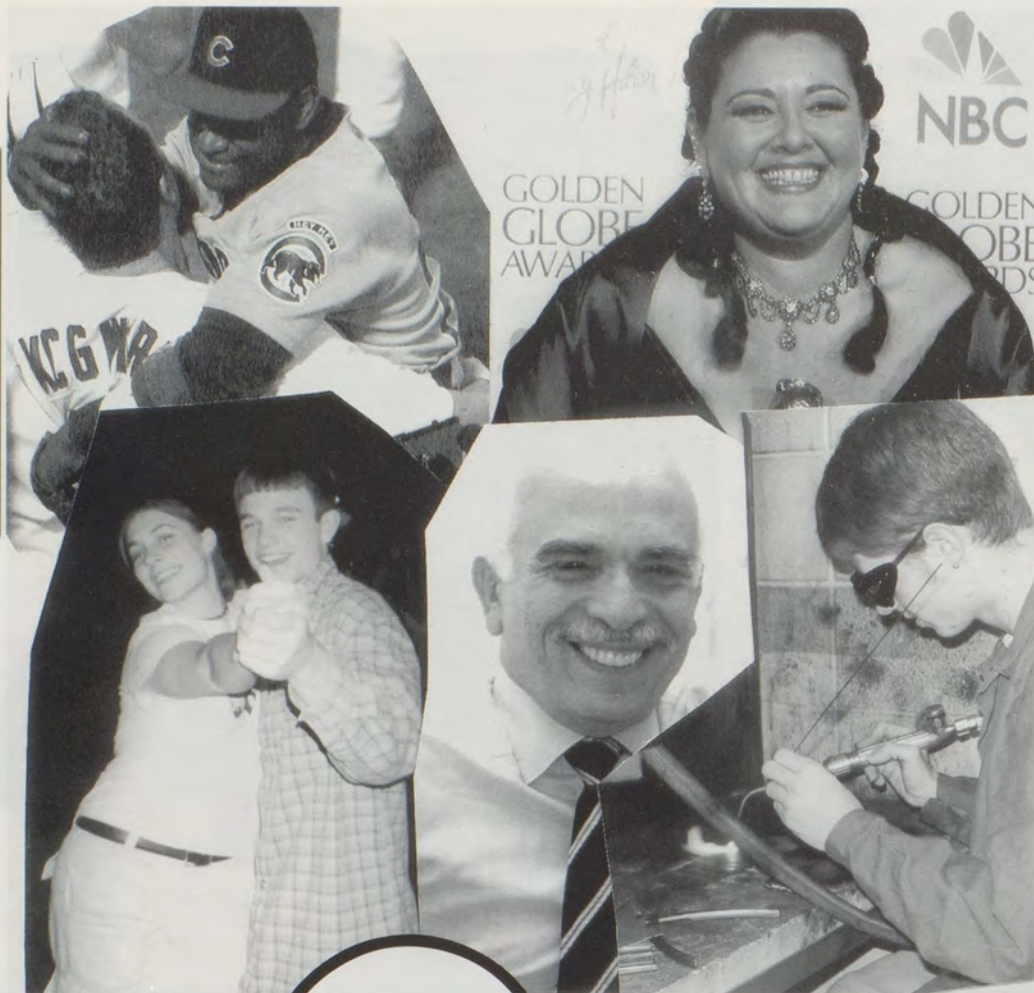

Everything that is important can be classified as an issue, entertainment, or a relationship.



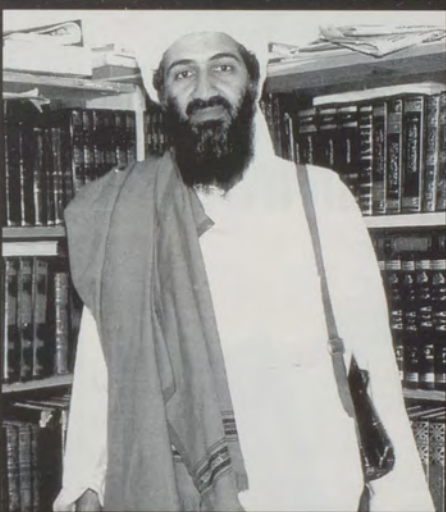

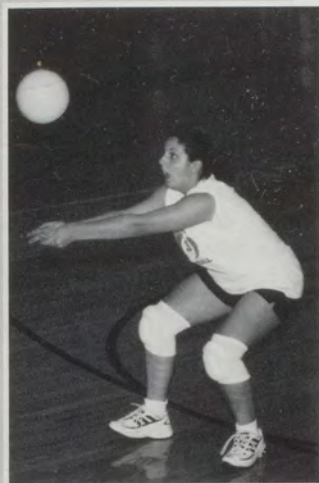

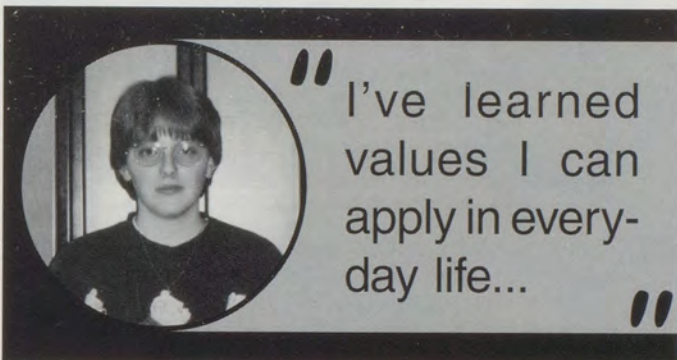

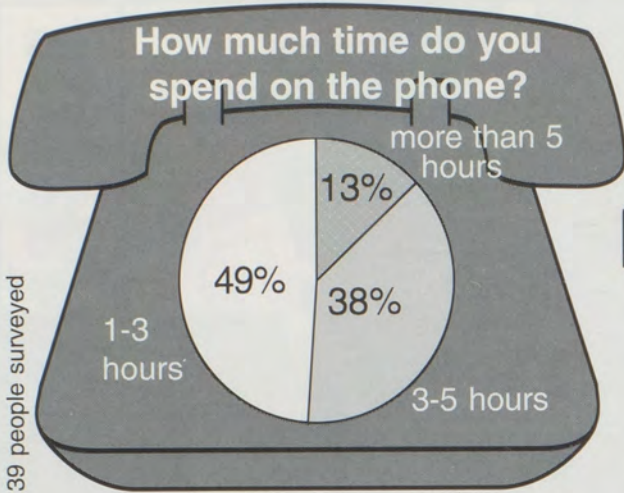

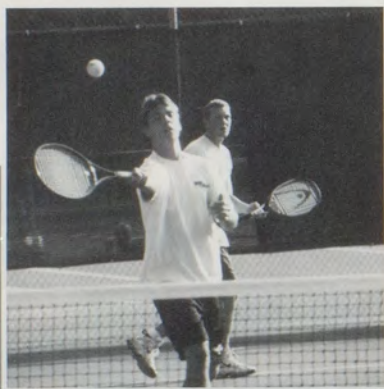

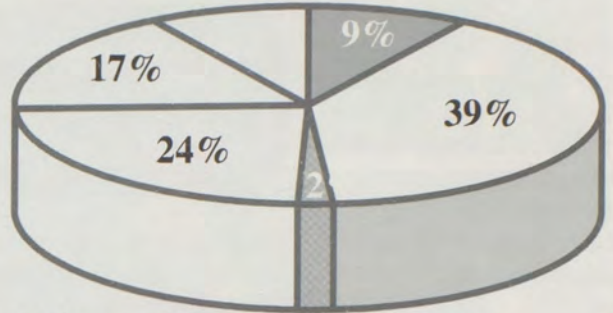

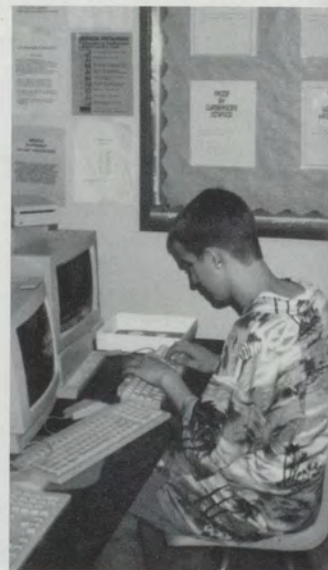
Rotating Teachers Make

You start breathing heavily. Your palms become sweaty. Your heart starts racing. You're trying to remember what the teacher was saying while you were falling asleep.

Does this sound familiar? Whether it is a college senior or an elementary student, everyone has taken a test at some point in their life. Everyone knows how much stress they can cause.

For many students, teachers are the main stress-causers. This stress is caused by the teachers who just can't assign enough work at one time. "It gets on my nerves when teachers assign a lot of hard assignments just to make us mad, and then laugh about it," said Keri Wells. "What stresses me out is when I'm jumping up and down to get a teacher's attention, and they still don't see me," said Jana Imlay.

Major stress-causing factors for all high school students are final exams. Since these come twice a year and count as twenty percent of the final grade, they cause huge stress to all students. "I get stressed when we have three tests in the same day," said Lisa McDonald.

A huge stress factor for sophomores is the ISTEP+ test. Students are able to take the test every time it is offered. If they take it every time and meet the required Core 40 classes, then they can graduate on time. "The unfair part is the fact that this one test is made out to be such a big deal when you've been in school for twelve years," said Laura Pope.

The Failures and Successes of Life

The amount of time that the ISTEP+ took also caused much stress. "What I don't like is the fact that we have to sit in there for two hours and we only get a ten minute break," said Leah Sneed. "I also hate how we have time limits on each separate test, and if we don't get it done during the two hours, then we have points taken off for that," said Chelsea Helbert.

The ISTEP+ is taken in September, which caused much stress to sophomores, because they only have a month to review, and the test contains geometry and other sophomore subjects which they have not been taught. "I didn't stress about it, but I'm glad I passed," said Dereck Martin.

A test that is even more stressful is the SAT. This is the biggest test for seniors, the one that will determine whether a person goes to the college of their choice, or goes to college at all. "The test was stressful for me because when it comes to English and Math, my self-confidence is very low. Plus I had to sit by the air conditioner and it was the middle of winter!" said Erin Wood.

The PSAT is offered each winter to sophomores and juniors. This experience was a foreshadowing into the next year when worrying about college and the future will become a reality. "The PSAT was easy, so I'll do ok on the SAT," said Erica Mitchell.

Whether it is the SAT, a final exam, or a pregnancy test, there will be many tests in life. Life is a test in itself. -Amber Hundley

The cover was based on ideas generated by *Jetstream* staff members while visiting Josten's Clarksville plant. Final design was completed by Josten's artists.

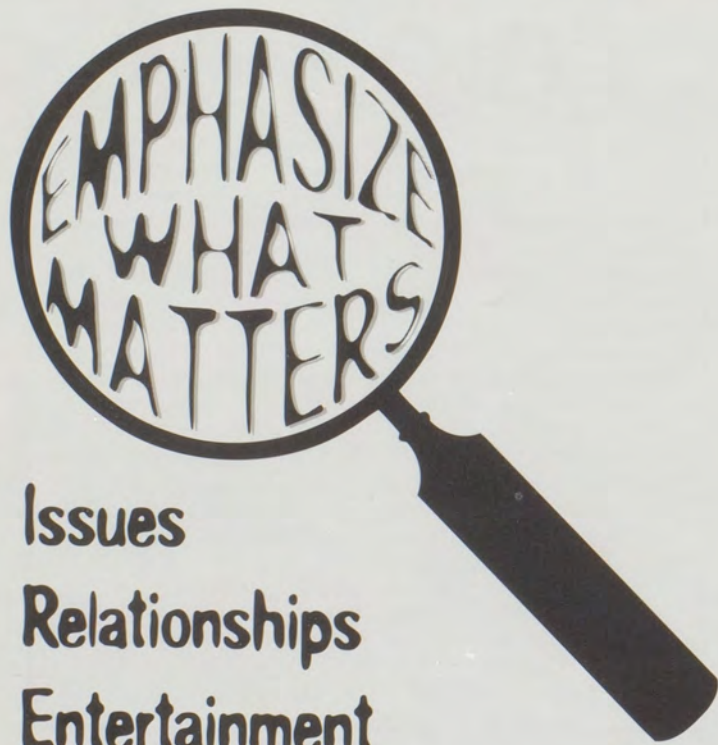
