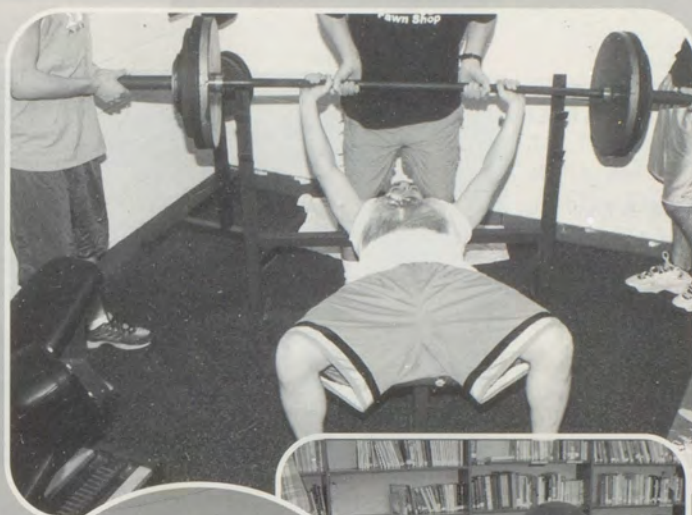
"As of last year I didn't really want to leave here. Now, I really want to get out of this area if not this state, and try my luck somewhere else," said Ben Cleland.

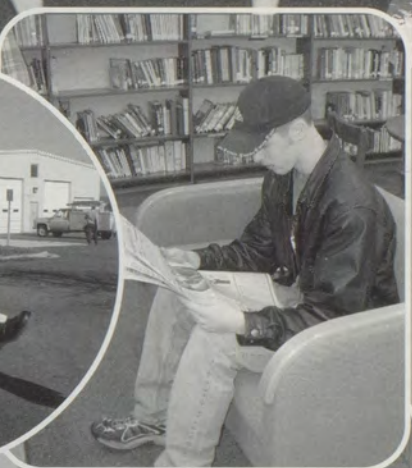
In their various roles, on and off the set, the stars' performances are featured at The Hauser Drive-In.

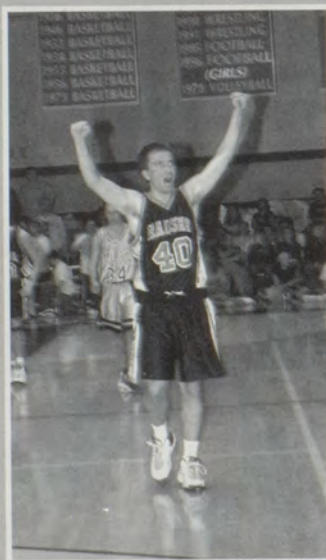

whole way to Milan.

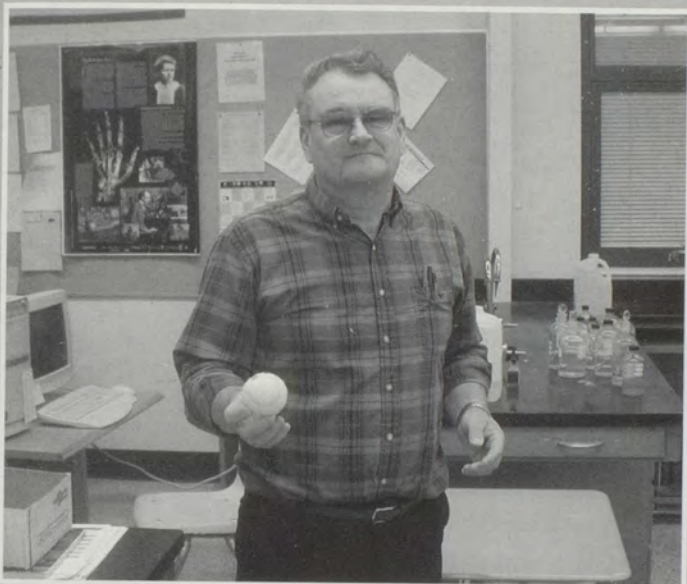

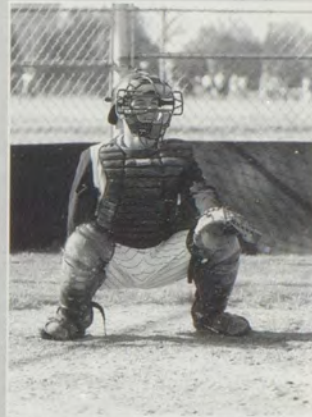
Tony fell down. "It looked like he was trying to move out of the way of the ball," said Nate.



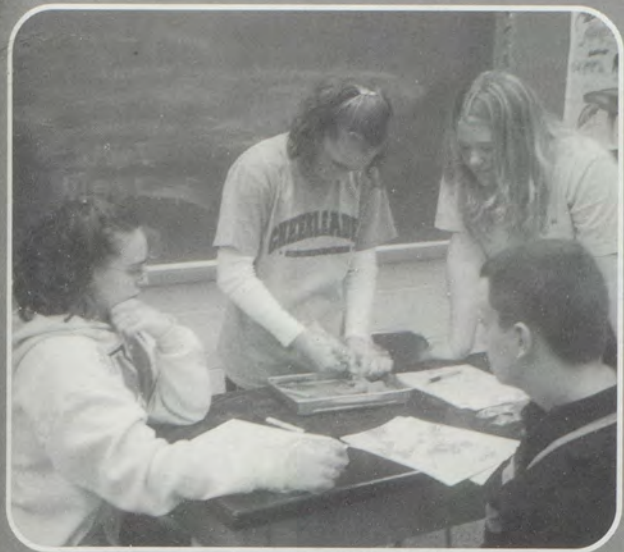
THE PERFECT LABORATORY

"I try to keep all of my grades up so I can play basketball. If I didn't study and get good grades my parents and coach wouldn't let me play," said Aaron Hurt

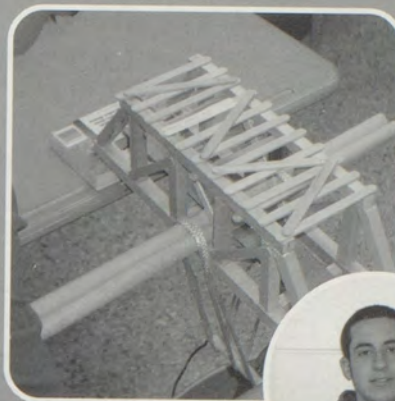

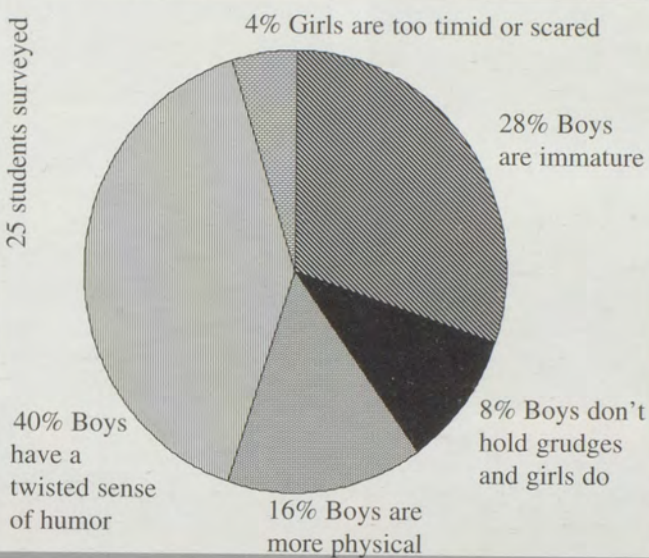

"The worst thing that happened to me was, they made me take down my spikes for the meets. They take a lot of time to put up. I was kind of bummed about it," said Nick Critney.

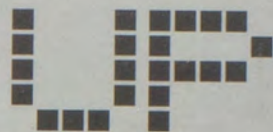

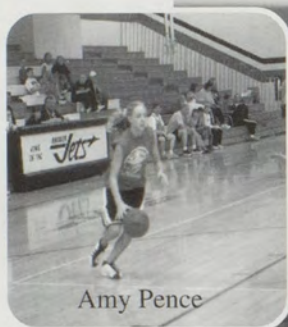
Have you ever had so many things to do and so little time to do them? Trying to keep all of the action under control is a goal of most students.

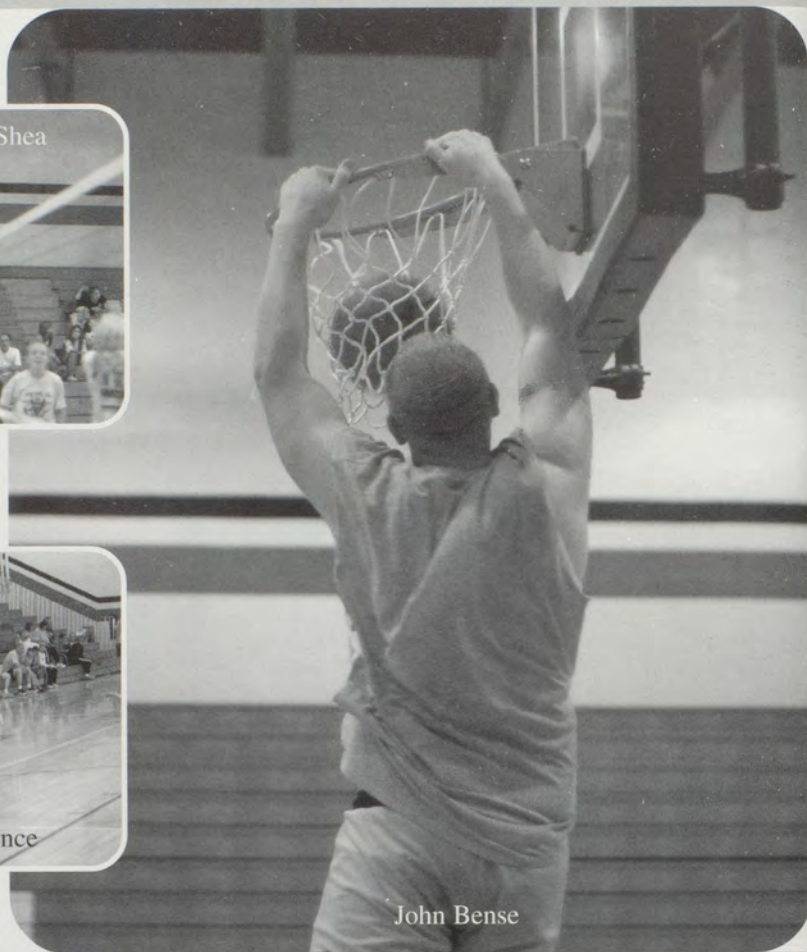

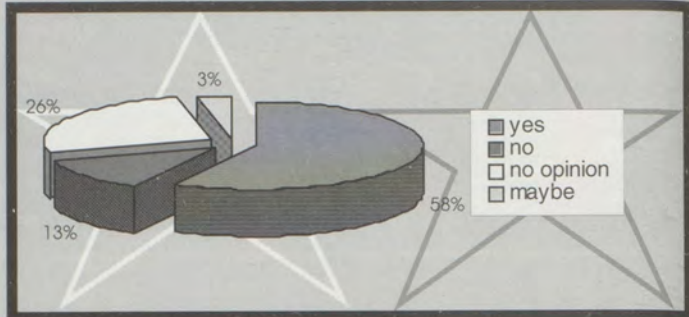
Queen of Music

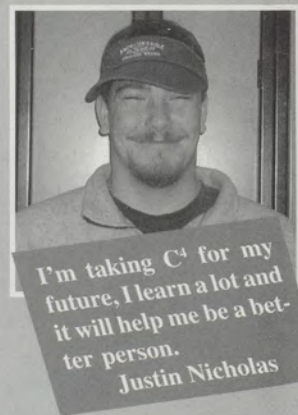
