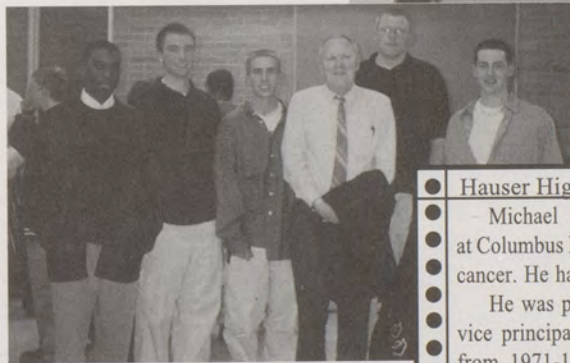

● **A mixture of colors, a mixture of meanings.** This sunrise was taken on the last day Mr. Brock came to school. He now knows what sunrises look like from heaven.

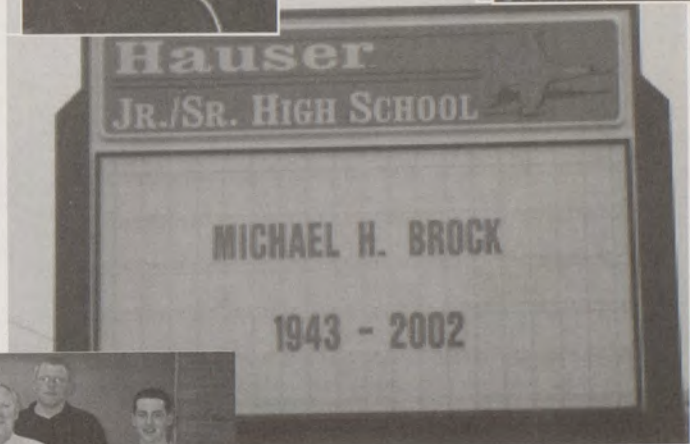

● **Hauser High School Principal: Michael Harold Brock**

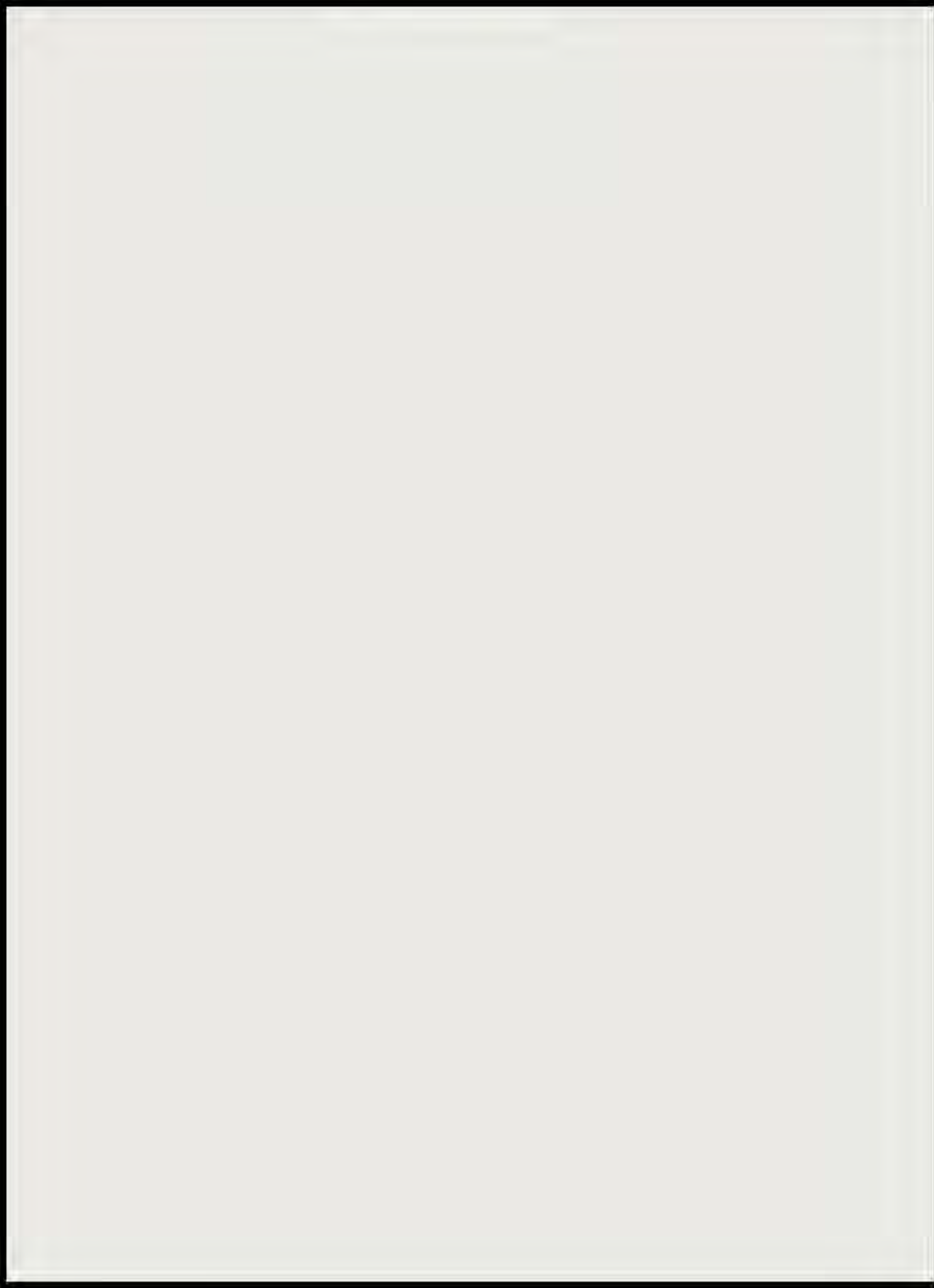
● Michael Brock, 59, died at 1:50 p.m. Friday, Dec. 6, 2002 at Columbus Regional Hospital after a two-year battle with lung cancer. He had previously recovered from bladder cancer.

● He was principal at Hauser High School from 1999-2002, vice principal from 1990-1999, and a Social Studies teacher from 1971-1990. He also coached boys' and girls' varsity basketball and track.

● Michael Brock was a former senior class, Student Council, and Fellowship of Christian Athletes sponsor. He also aided in the running of sporting events at Hauser.

● The funeral was at 11 a.m. December 9, 2002 at St. Peter's Lutheran Church. Burial was at Garland Brook Cemetery with veteran rites by Bartholomew County Veterans Color Guard.



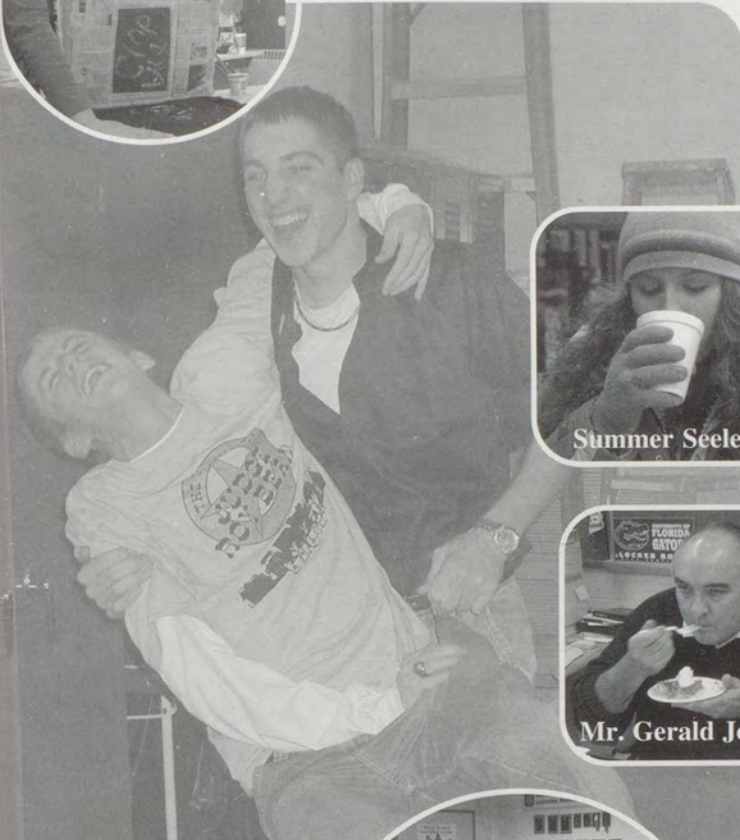

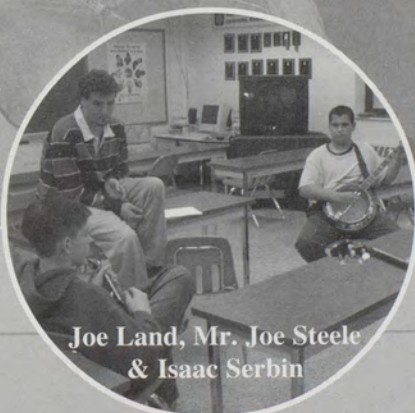

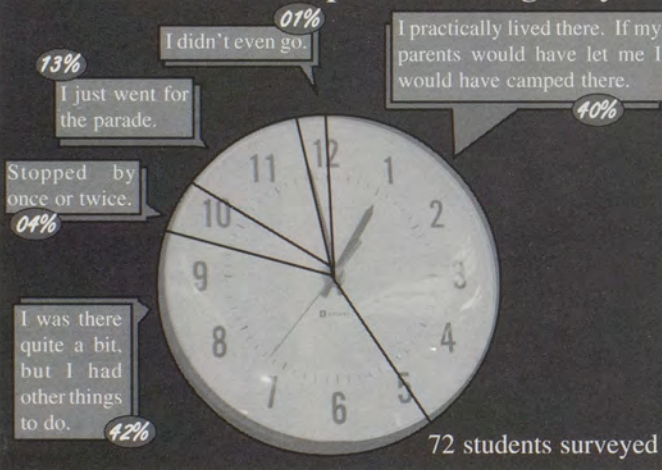

Hall decorating is also a big part of spirit week. Hall decorating started at the end of school that day and lasted

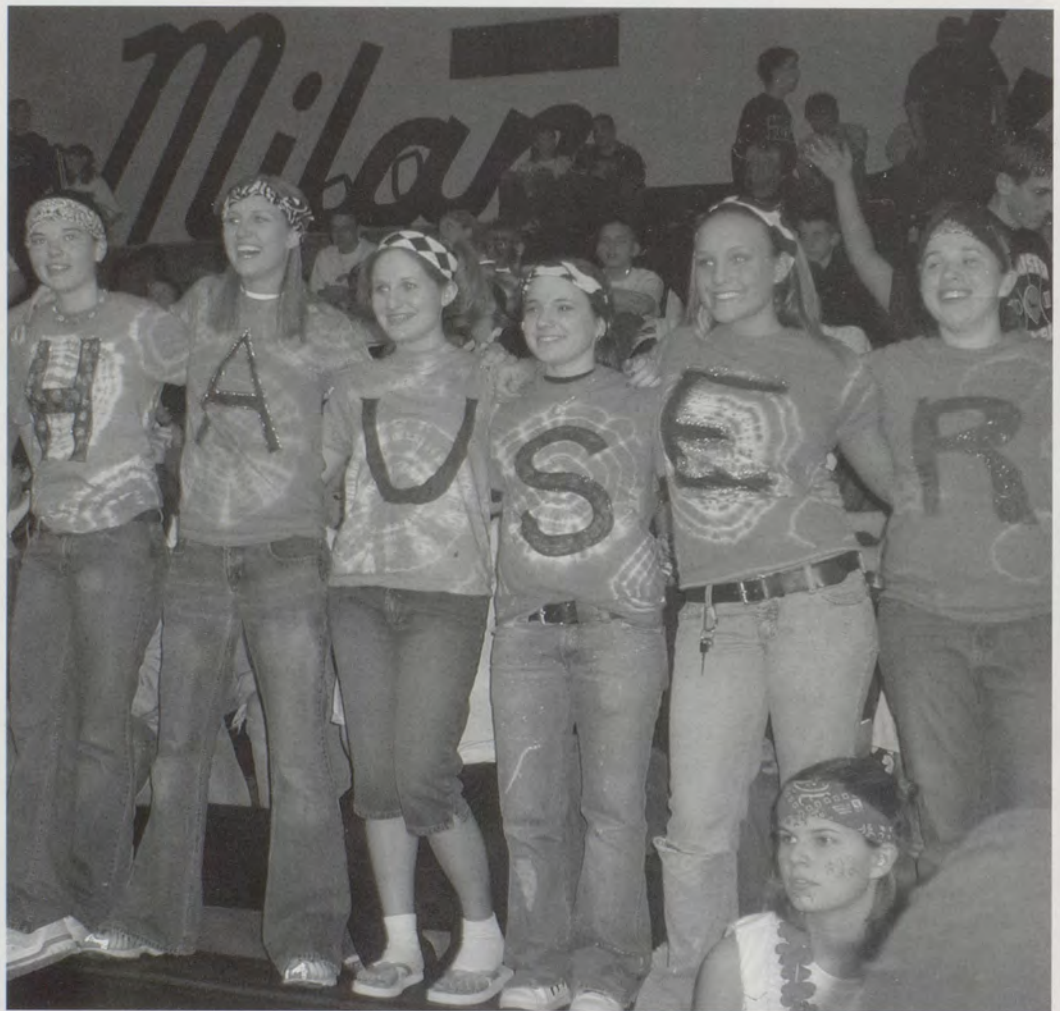
until eight o'clock that night. "Hall decorating is fun because you get to hang out with friends. It's also fun to see the other halls," said Jill Brinker

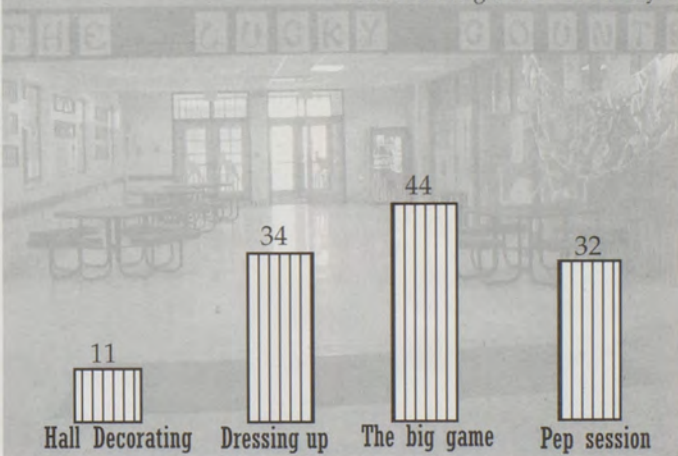

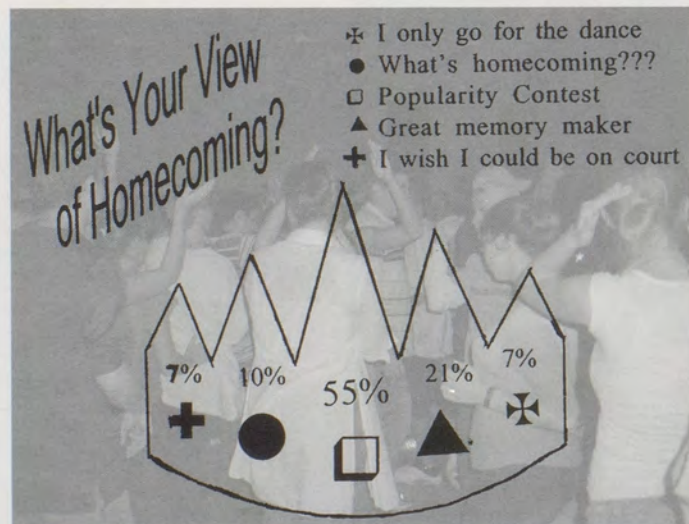
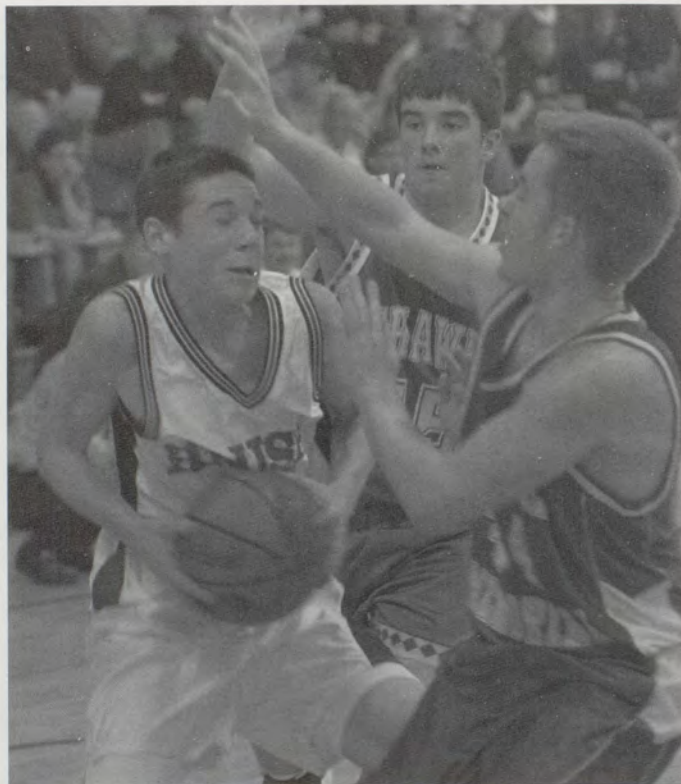

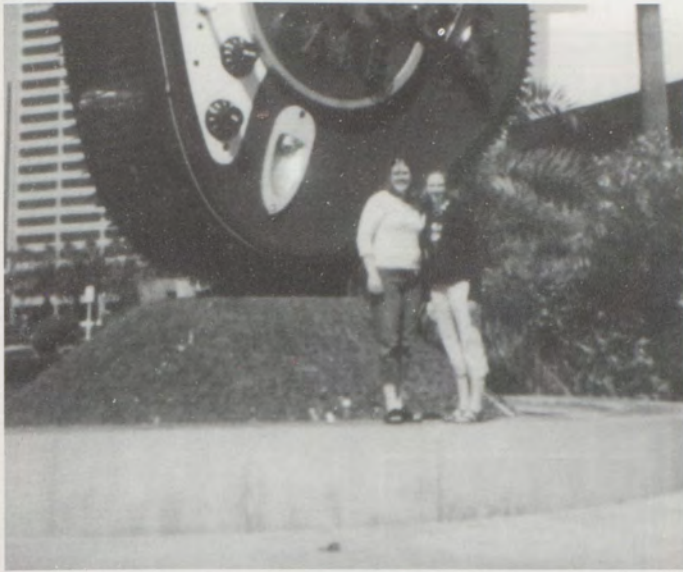

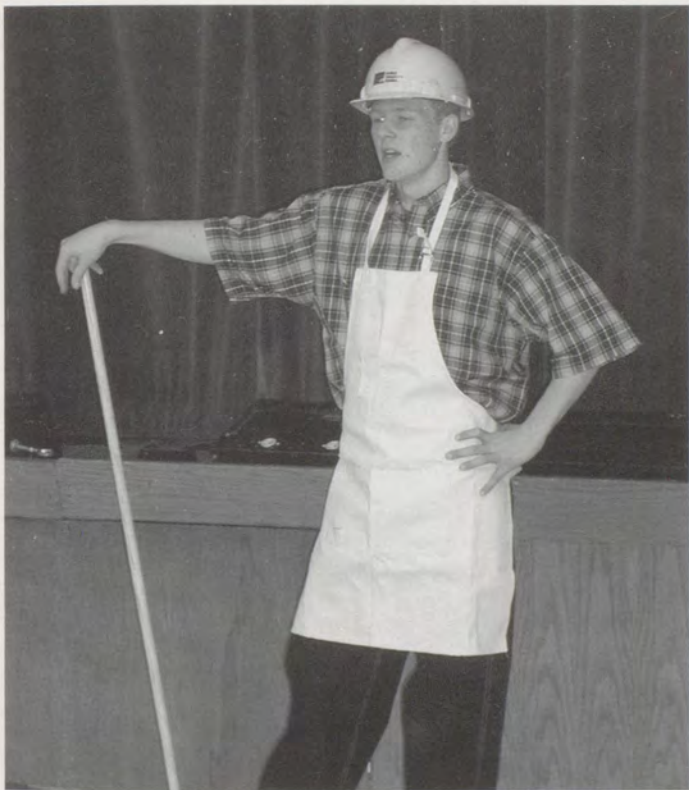

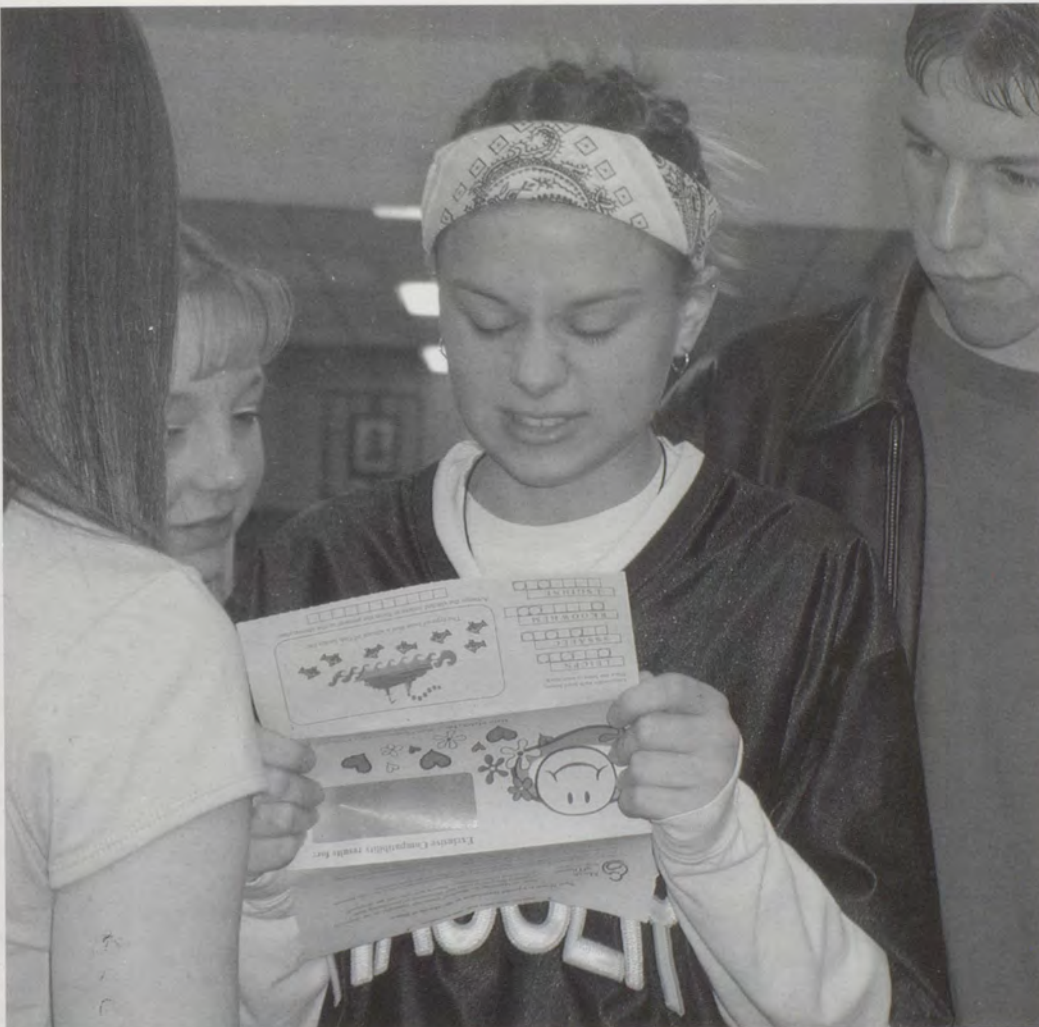

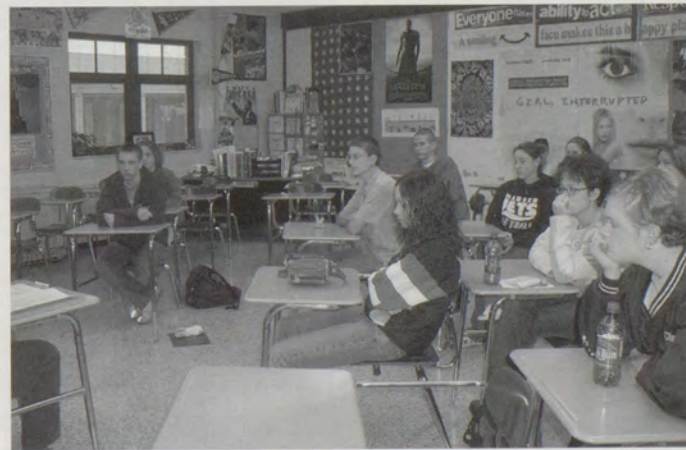

No matter what, German Club meetings always involve food. "Our club members get more than just a taste of the German culture," said member Joe Land.



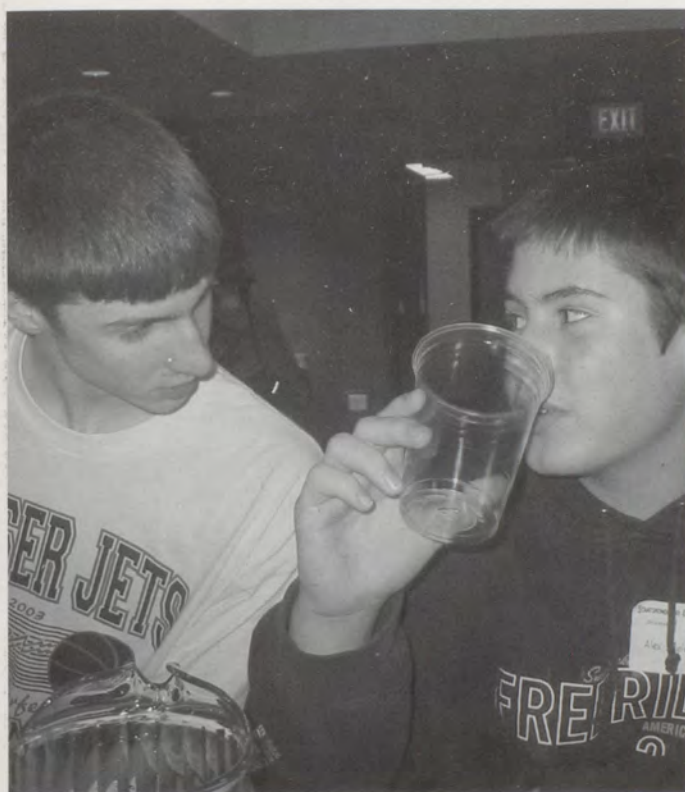

"My favorite part of yearbook is getting layouts approved; it feels good getting things accomplished," said Ashley Clemons.

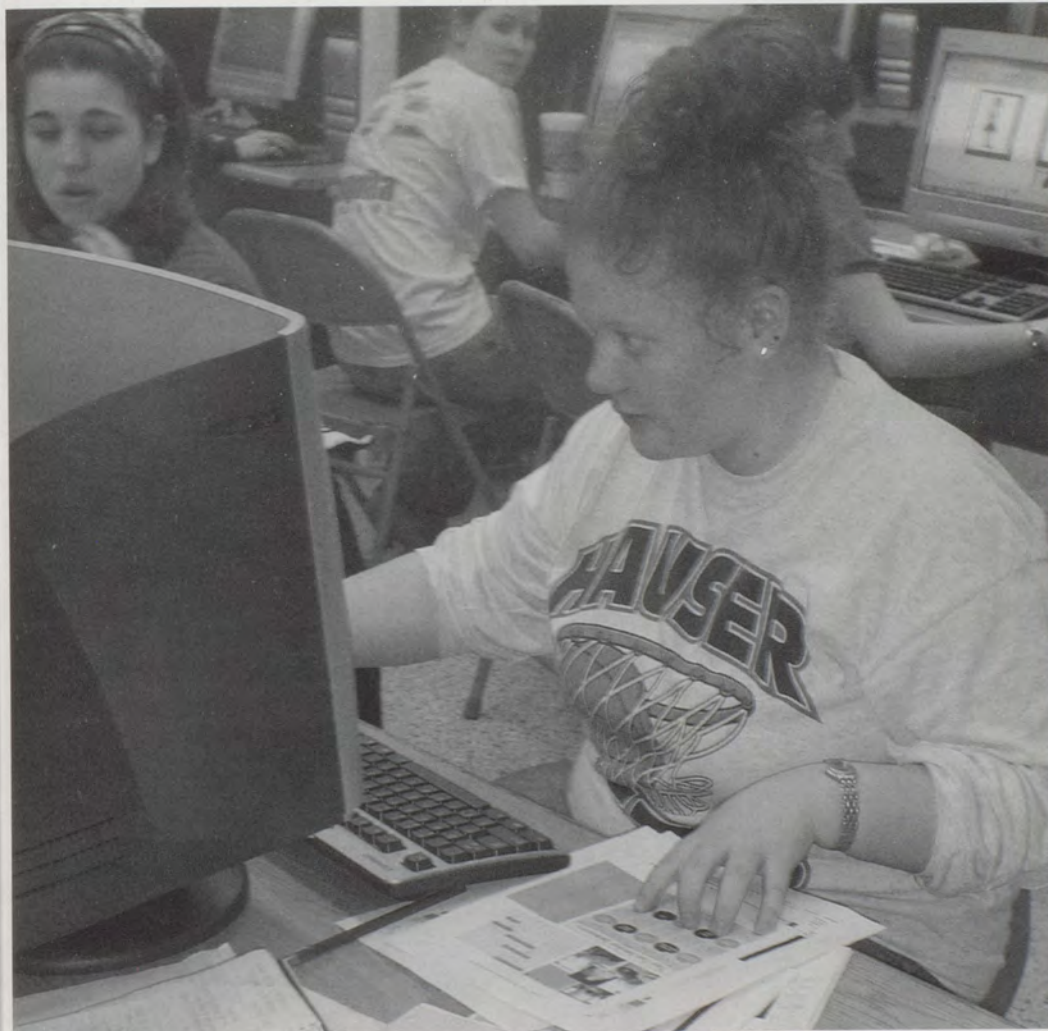
The yearbook staff did more

Mrs. Robin Ramp and Mr. Steele, new to Hauser last year, both did units on poetry.

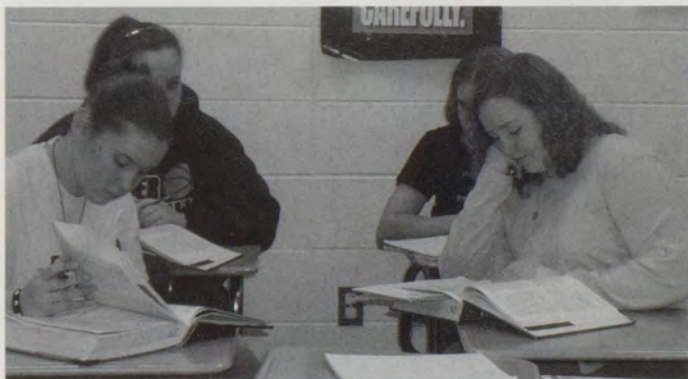

"Math is the language often used to describe the world around us. We can use math equations to explain and describe the sounds we hear (trigonometric sine waves), the movements we see like a football thrown through the air, the instructions for creating our favorite foods and scents, and the dimensions of the things around us," said Mrs. Wanda Siebert.

Students in pre-calculus saw how math described the world around them when they made radian circles. "You can use radian measure and arc

length to find the distance between far away places accurately. Pilots use this formula," said Ryan Shepherd.

The pre-calculus students also drew radian circles, which is a circle that has a radius of one and circumference of  $2\pi$ , into snowmen. "Mrs. Siebert told us to keep the radian snowmen as friends and to make sure to reflect upon them from time to time because they would be essential to our life; I named mine Billy," said Summer Seeley.

In Geometry, students combined art and math in

some of their projects. One group used circle art from Hindu and Native American cultures and came up with some circle art of their own. They also combined art with math by making quilts, punching holes in tin foil, and by making their own designs that were to show their knowledge of rotation, reflection, and translation.

Also in geometry, students were given eight solids and had to discover which shape would best fit the solids while using the least amount of material to package the solid. The students were able to choose their pack-

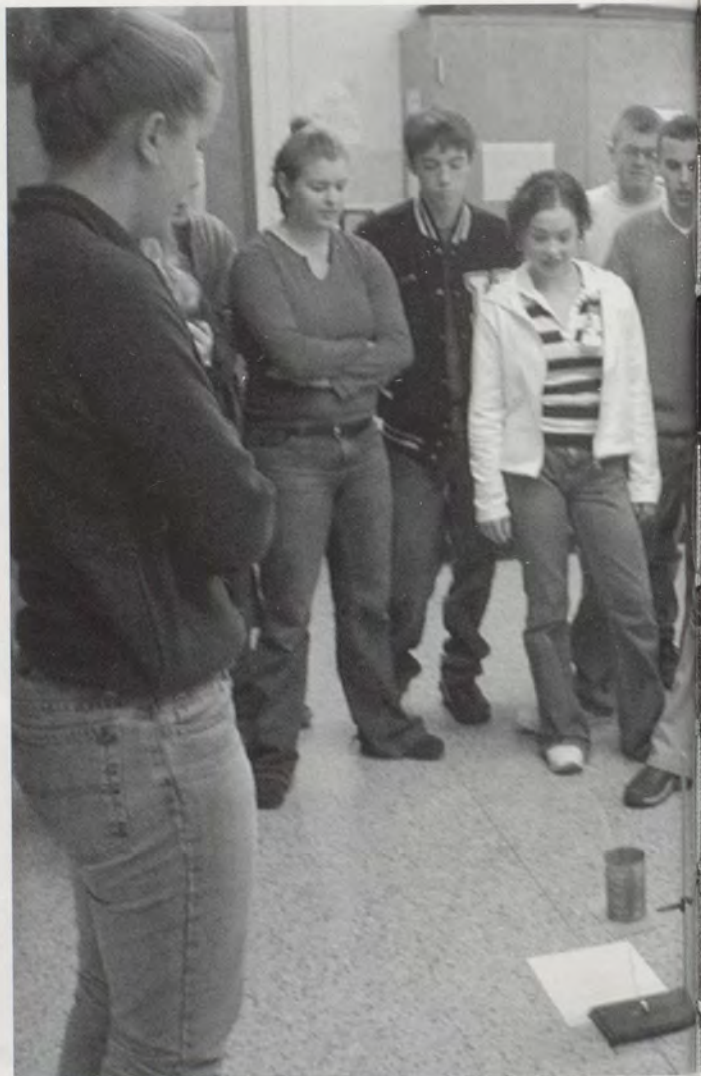
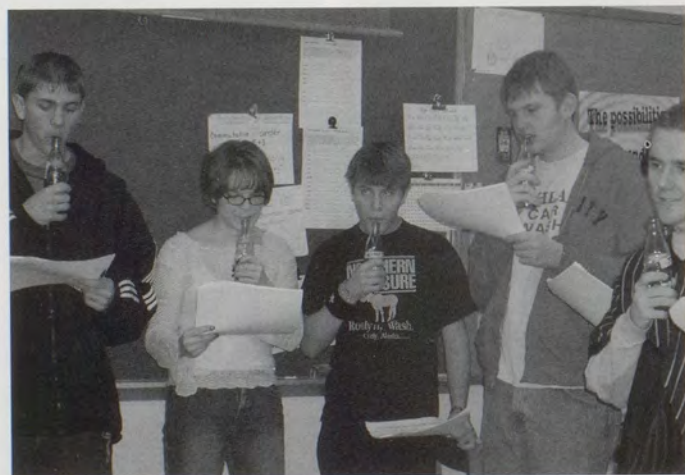
age from many shapes such as cones, prisms, pyramids, squares, and circles.

Though radian circles and the geometry projects weren't new, the amount of time and effort put into reviewing for the math portion of the ISTEP and the percentage of tenth graders that passed the ISTEP, was. "We've really been trying to push the tenth graders this year, and thankfully we had 70 percent of the tenth grade students pass the math portion of the ISTEP as a direct result of that effort," said Ms. Kim Harsh.

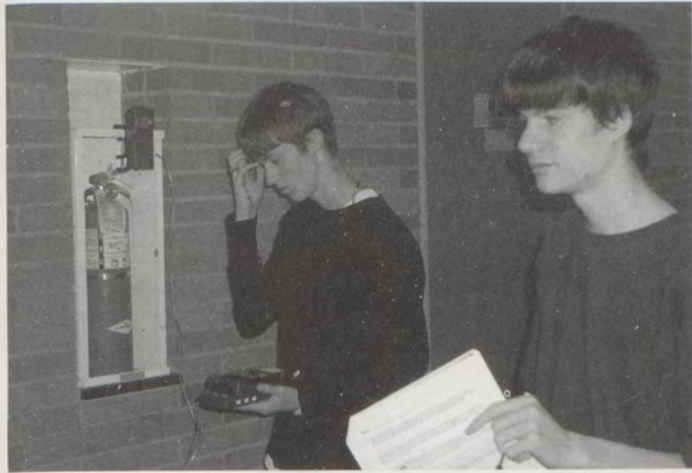

In the 7th grade science class, students worried more about the rats having an accident than the mild odors. "The rats were not as bad as I

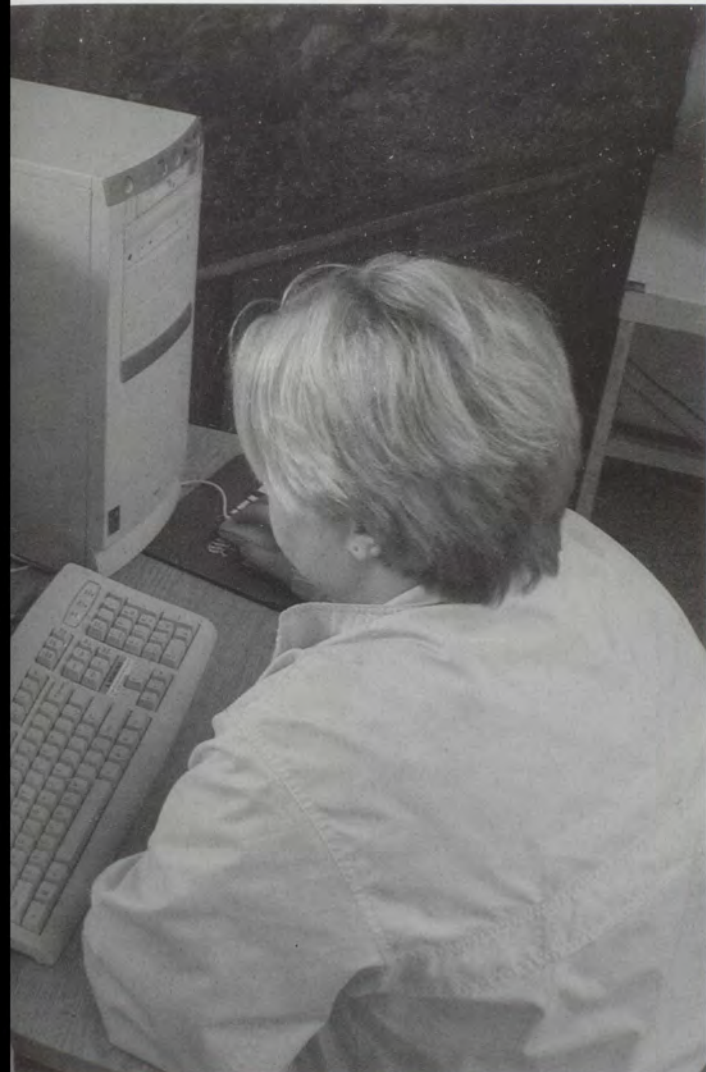
thought they would be. They didn't really smell much at all," said Shawna Lucas.

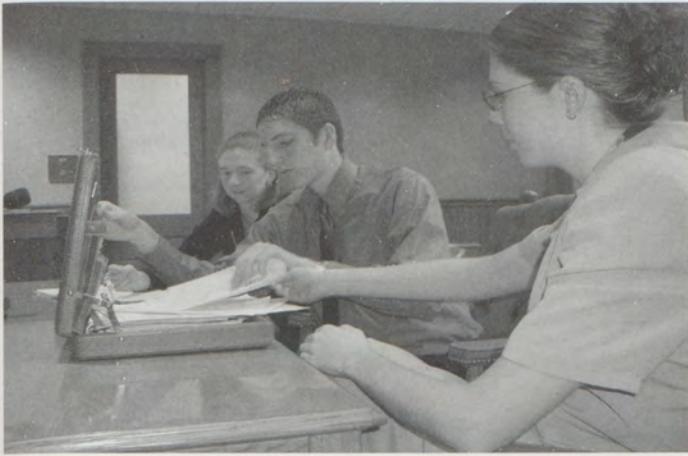

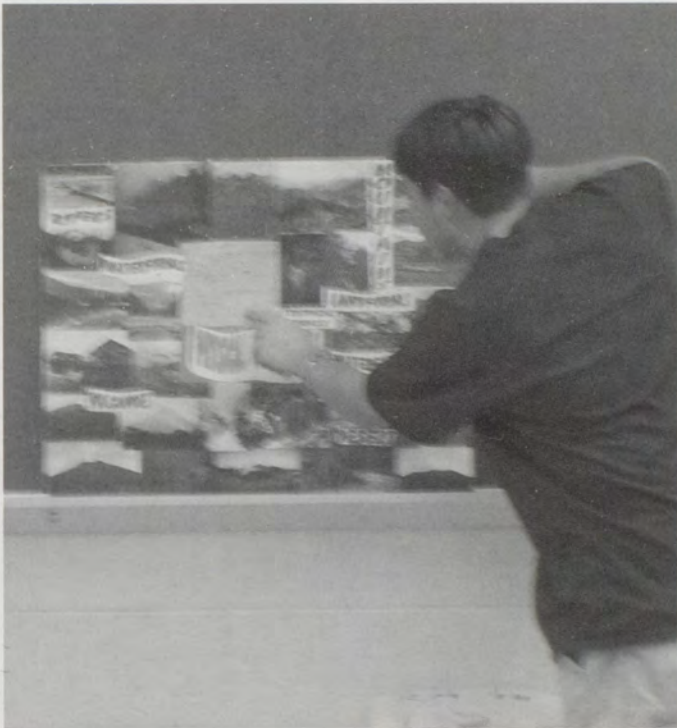

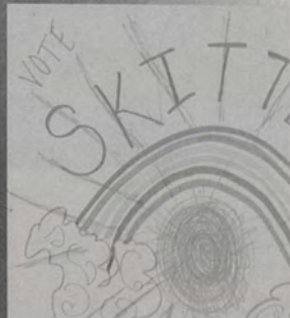


**Well I think...**

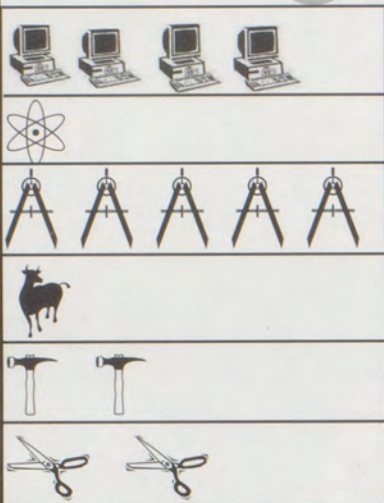
**Where is it!**

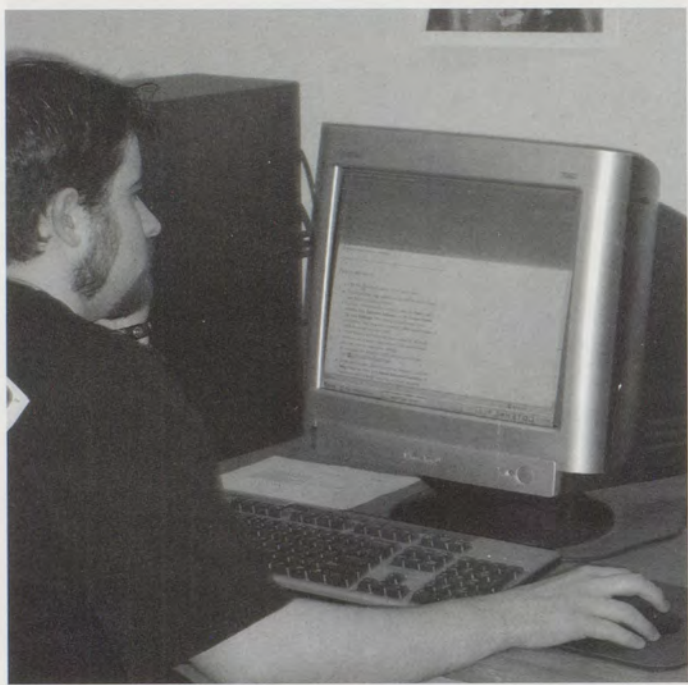
### Incoming!

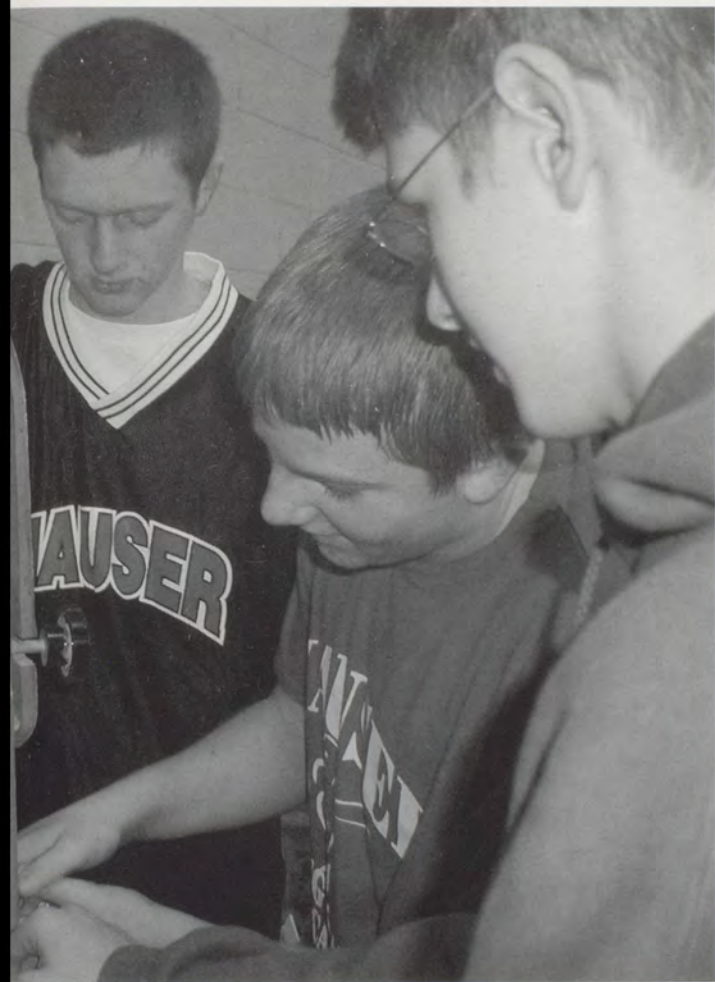

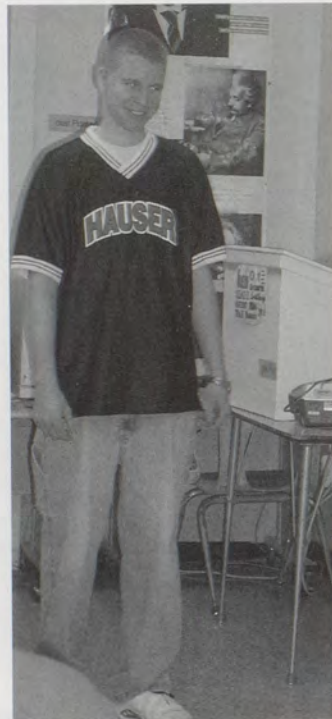
Overall, the students preferred projects and field trips to regular homework. "The field trip was a good learning

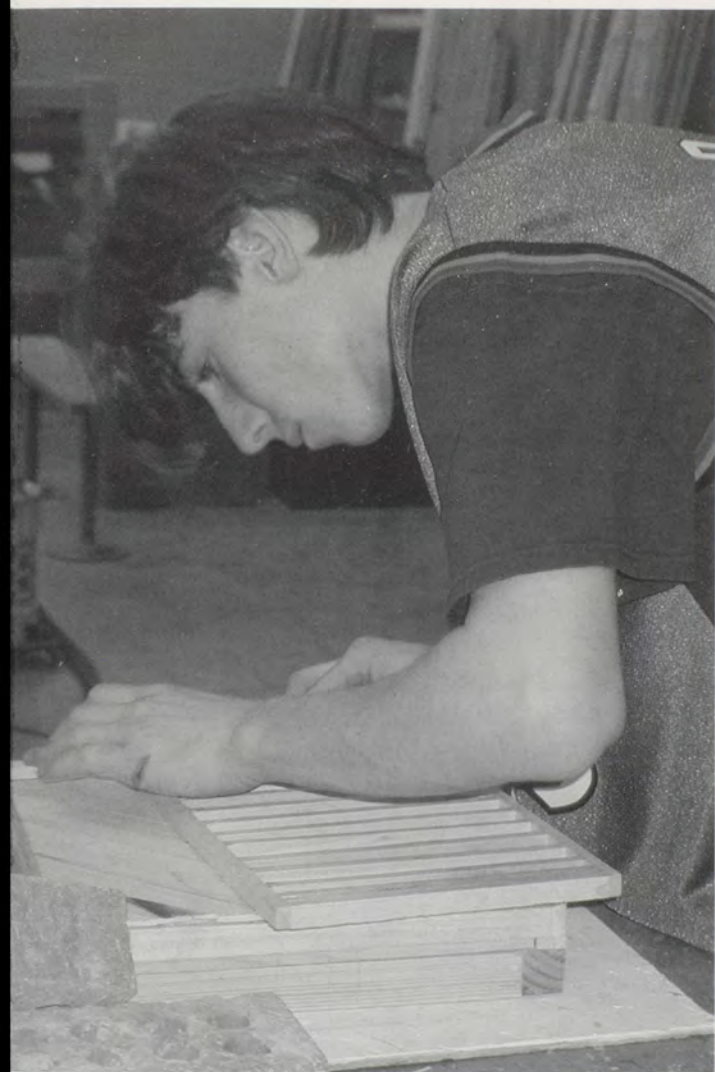
pend on their classmates' input. "I didn't have the same taste as some people in my class, so getting to choose my own recipes was a good idea," said Stephanie Wallace.

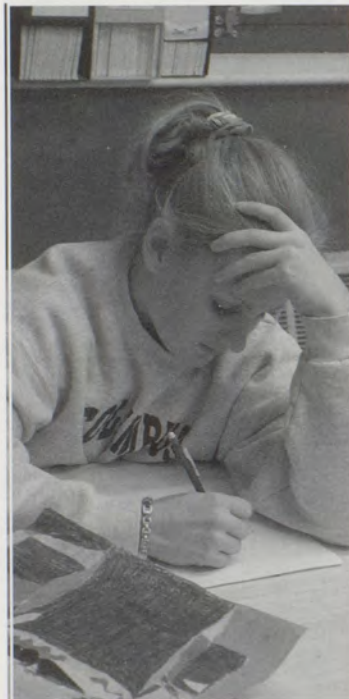

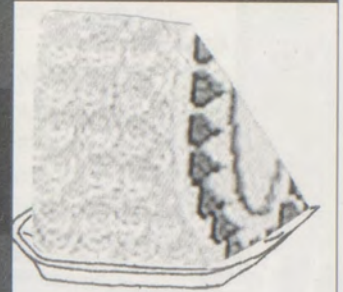

afternoon classes, C4 students may or may not be in class. "We meet at East on Friday for one hour and 35 minutes. "In ICE (Industrial Cooperative Education) we go to North on Wednesdays and usually spend an hour and a half in class. The other days I go to work if I am scheduled to work. So some weeks I may work 2 days, 3 hours a day, and other weeks I work 7 days, 30-35 hours. I get

paid for all of my hours, so it does not bother me when I have to work a lot. If I don't work many hours, then I wish I would have stayed at Hauser because I just waste my afternoon doing nothing," said Jason Hampton.

"C4 allows me to get credit for the job I already had for two years at Mancino's," said Jason. "I appreciate that!" "I love my C4 class. I meet people from other schools, the lessons are hard but the labs are fun. I look forward to going everyday," said Kathy Hatton.

# Training for life

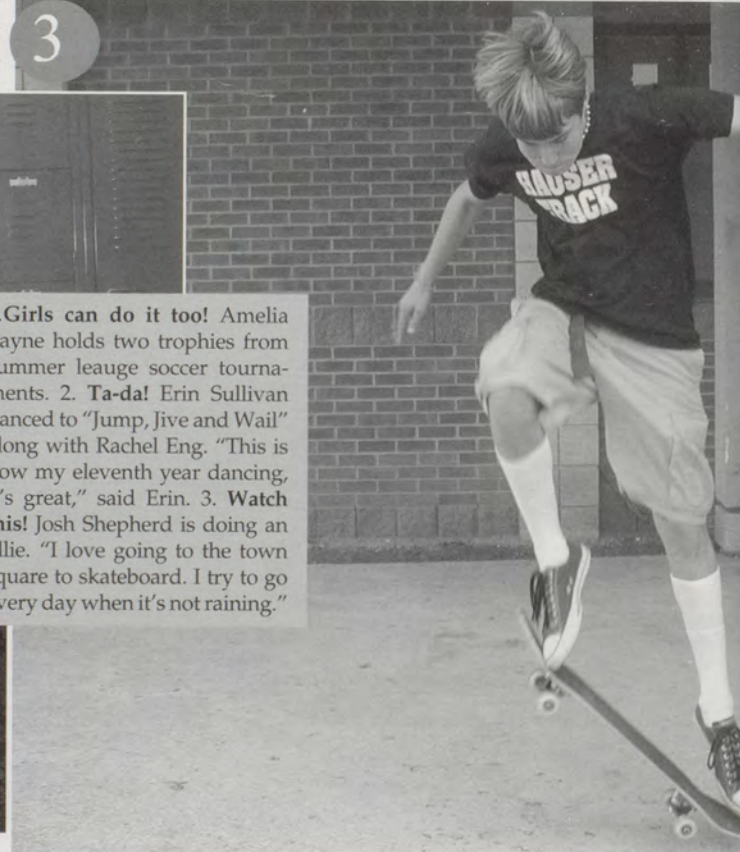

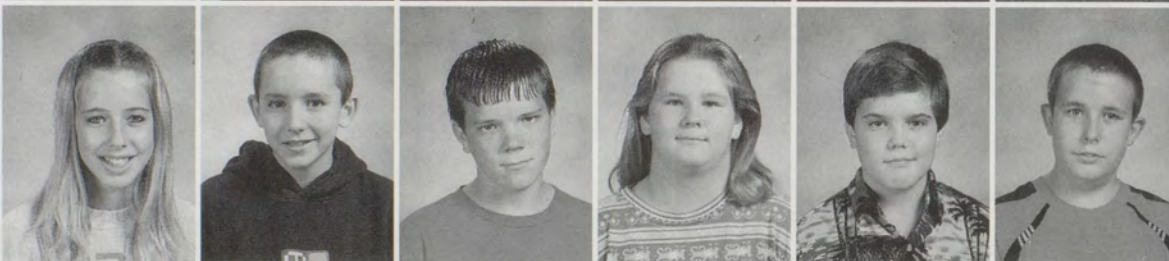

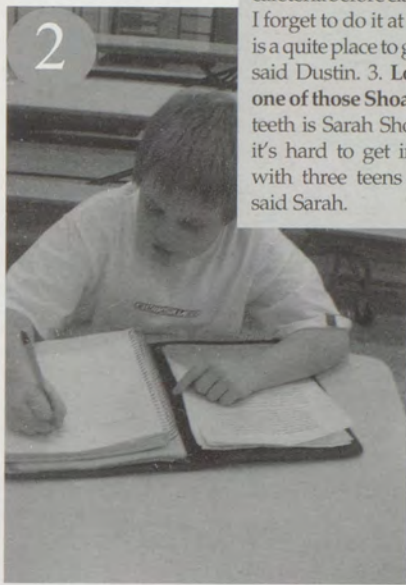
# 6 a.m. *wake up call*

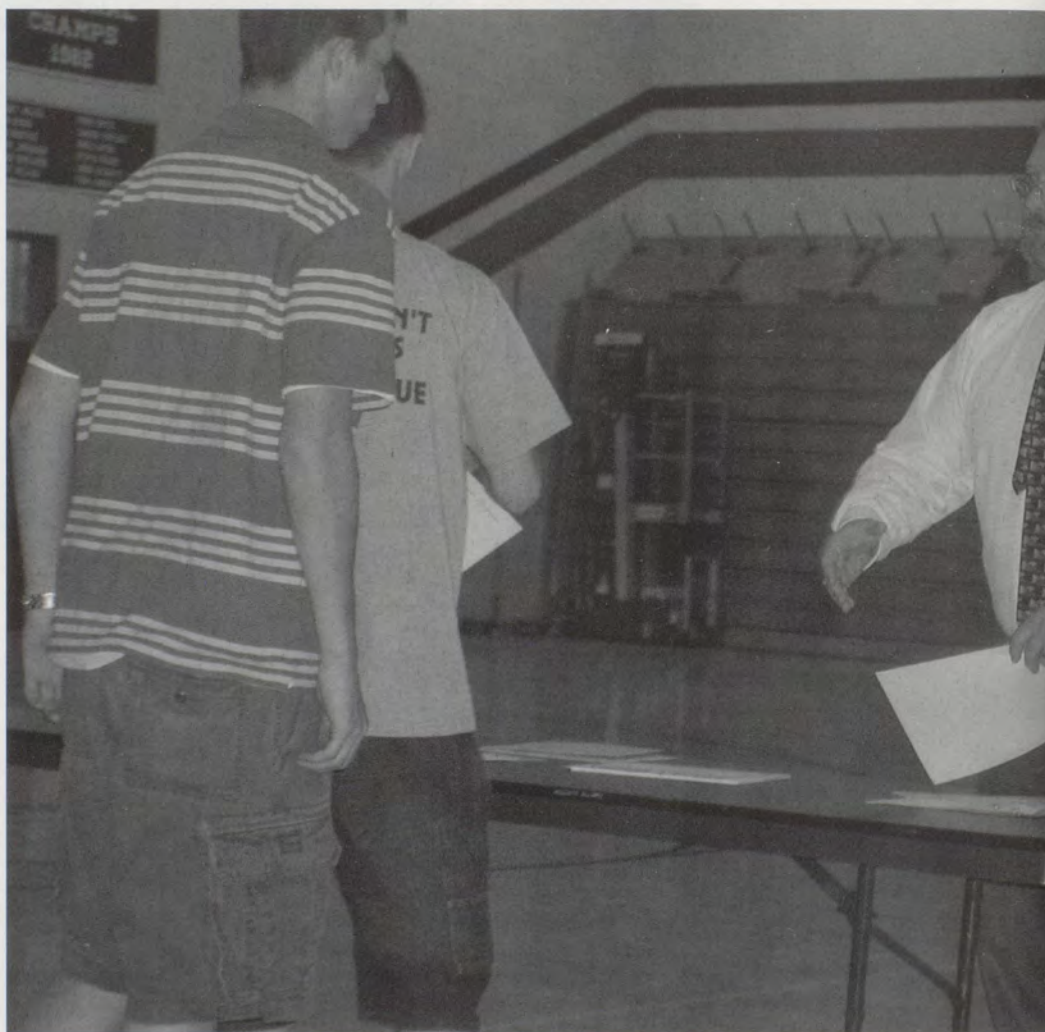
### What?! I like food.

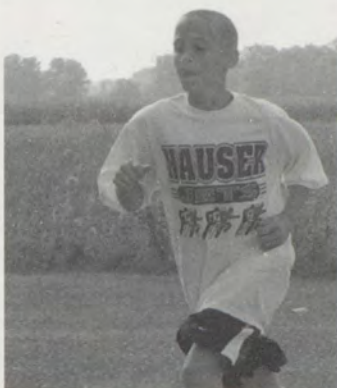

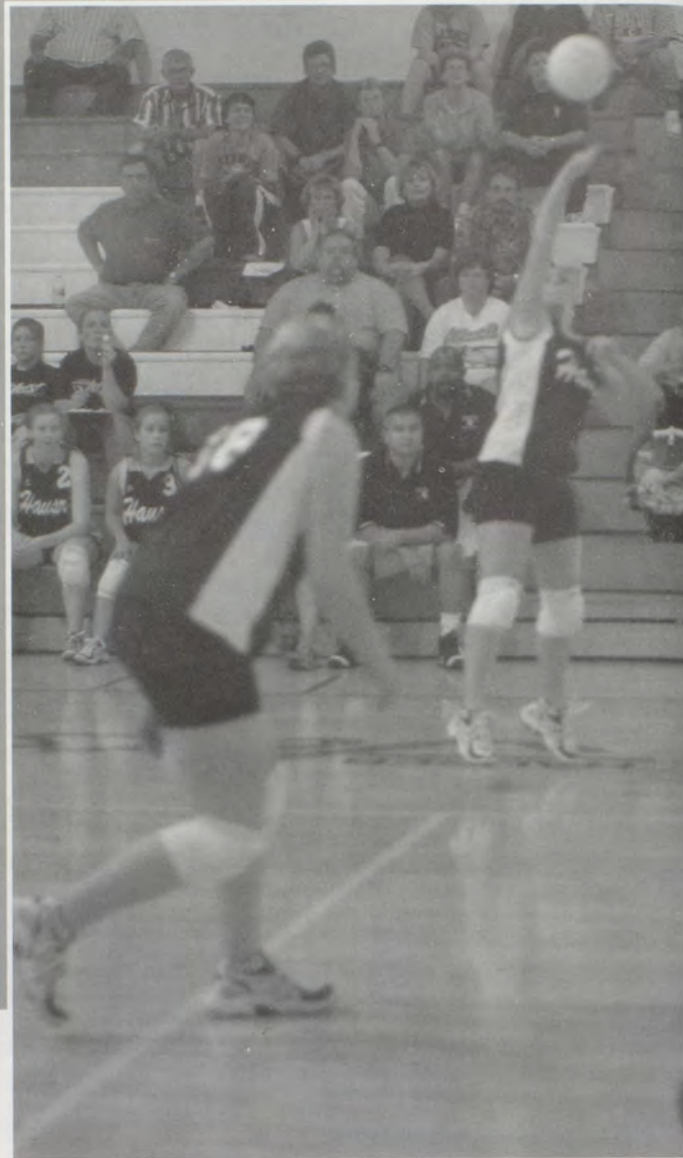

# Strong Defense: A taste of WINNING

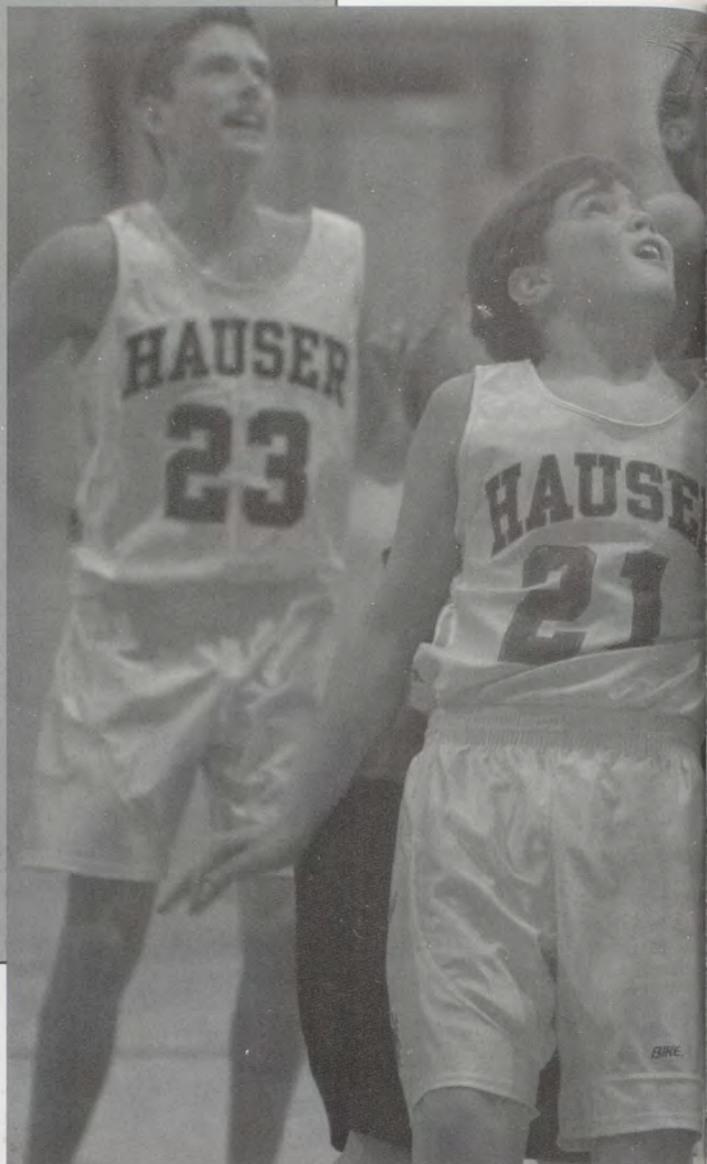

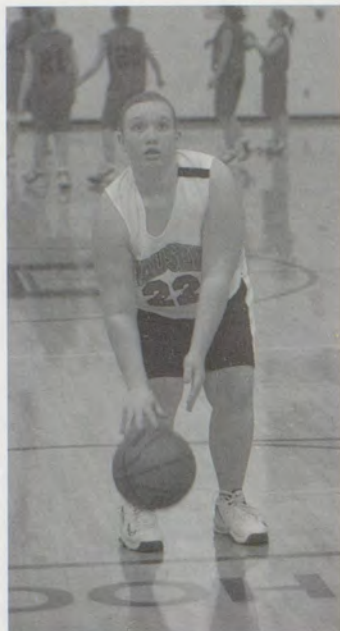

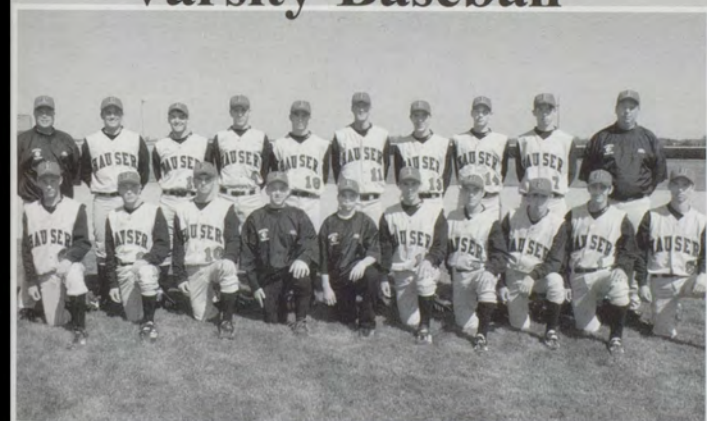

The book was printed on glossy 80 lb. paper. There are 176 pages of which 6 were printed in color.

Fonts used on Opening, Closing, Title and all Division pages include: *Freestyle Script*, *Arial*, *Times New Roman*, and *Palatino*. Fonts used on pages within each division include: *Times New Roman*, *Birch*, *Helvetica*, *Trebuchet*, and *Palatino*.

*Jetstream* staff members wrote all copy and captions. Infographics were designed and created by staff members also. Layouts were designed by members of the *Jetstream* staff.

Indiana School Pictures, James Zollman of *Captured Memories*, and *Jetstream* staff members took all of the photographs. All photographs were digital.

The endsheet was designed by staff member, Jill Brinker. Old photographs used on the end sheet were file photographs from previous *Jetstream* staffs.

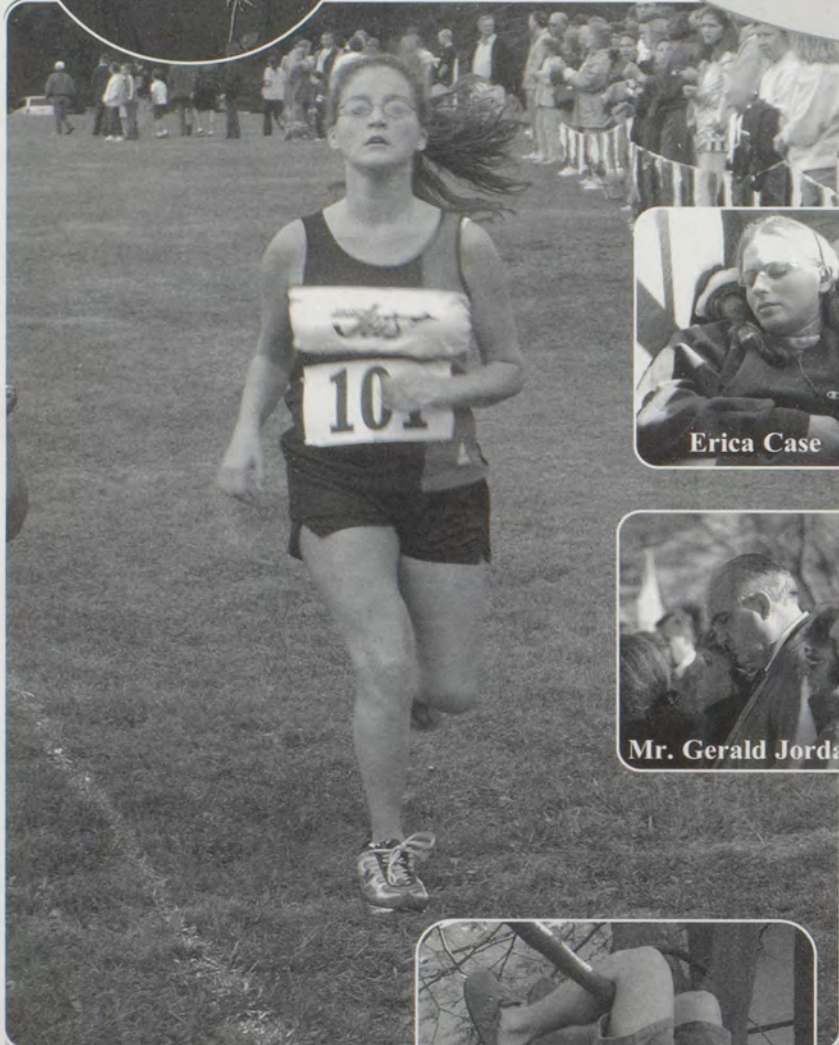
