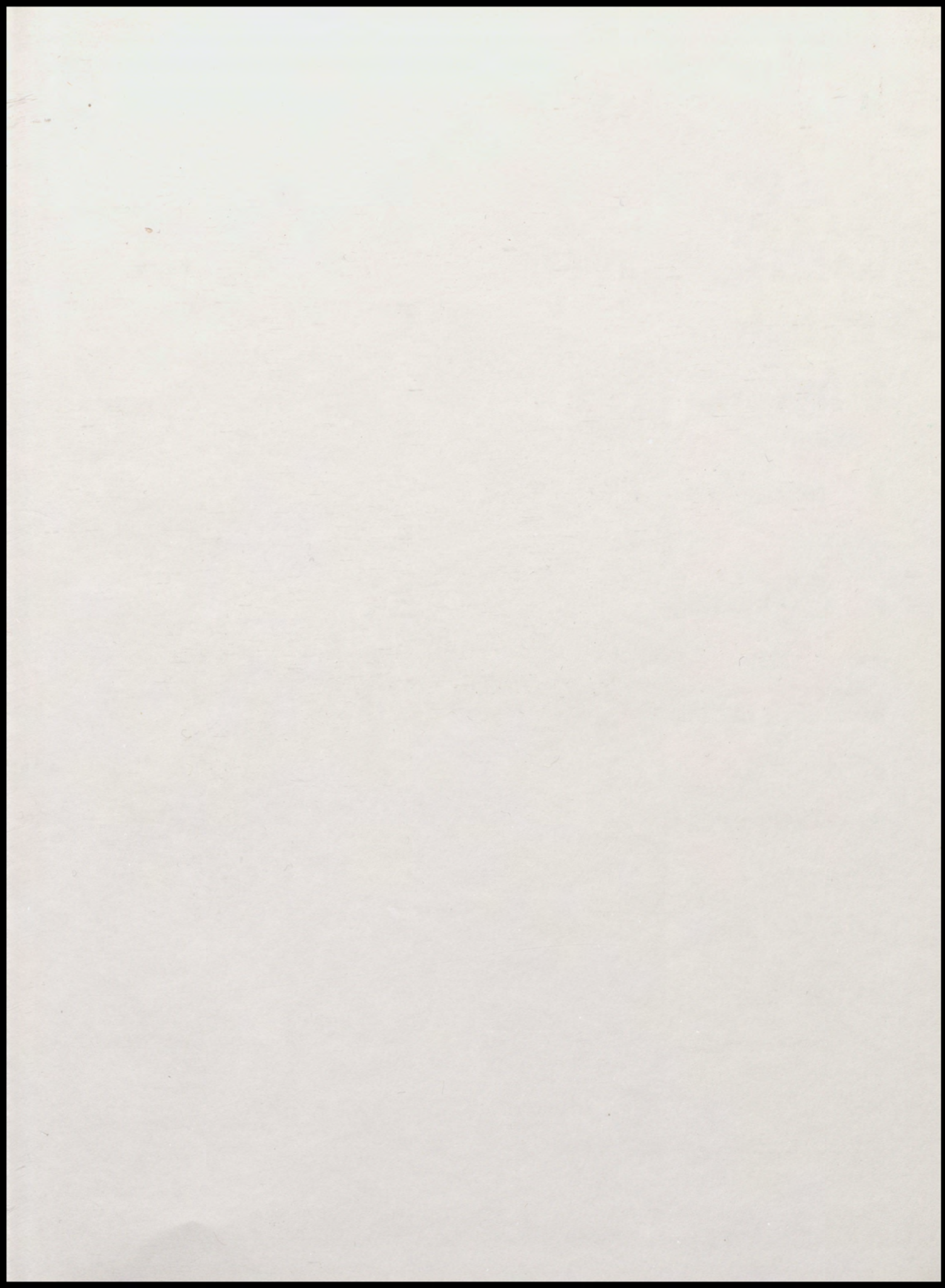


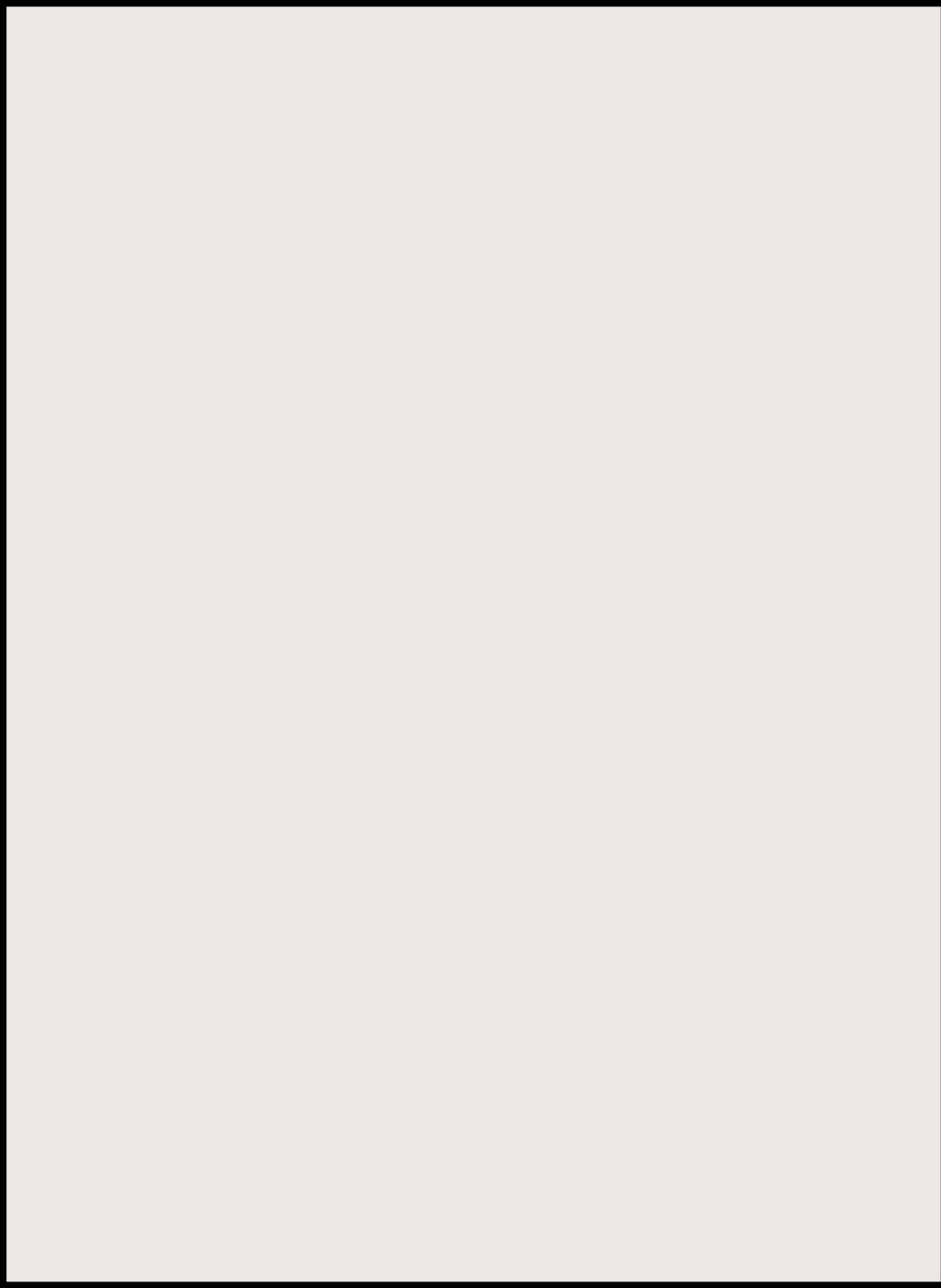

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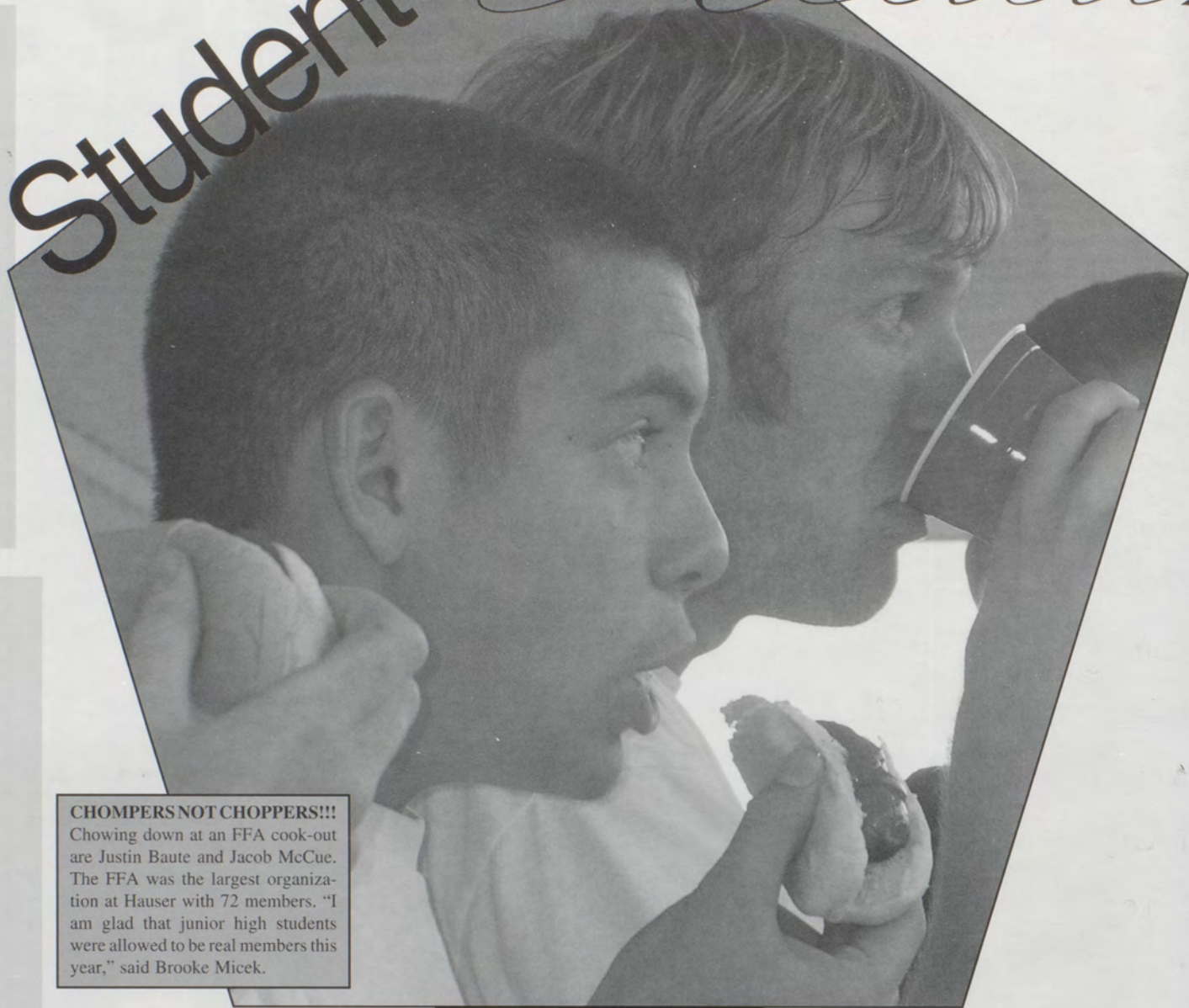

It's a record! Last year at the state fair Katelyn Heighway set a state record in leader dog competitions, receiving 198 points out of 200. "We knew that she would perform well but we were surprised at the final score," said Mr. Heighway.

On December 7, 2002, the Heighways were given a six-week-old female miniature yellow lab named Annie. They were to raise and train Annie to be a leader dog. "At first Annie wouldn't do anything she was supposed to. It was frustrating," said Katelyn. "All of the sudden Annie picked up the pace and began to do everything like she was supposed to be doing," said Mr. Heighway.

Annie's training was a shared responsibility among Mr. and Mrs. Heighway and Katelyn. They worked with Annie about 11 hours a week getting her ready to compete at the fair and preparing her to become a leader dog. Katelyn's 4-H group never had a leader dog before. "Other than seeing a representative from the leader dog school once a month, we had to call the school with any questions during the month prior to our next meeting," said Mr. Heighway.

They taught Annie to do the things that would be judged. "I taught her to walk on my left side in "lead out" position, come, sit, and stay at my command, ignore distractions, and walk up and down stairs properly," said Katelyn. "It was really hard, but she did it. It took her forever. I was proud," said Katelyn. "It was worth every bit of trouble we went through."

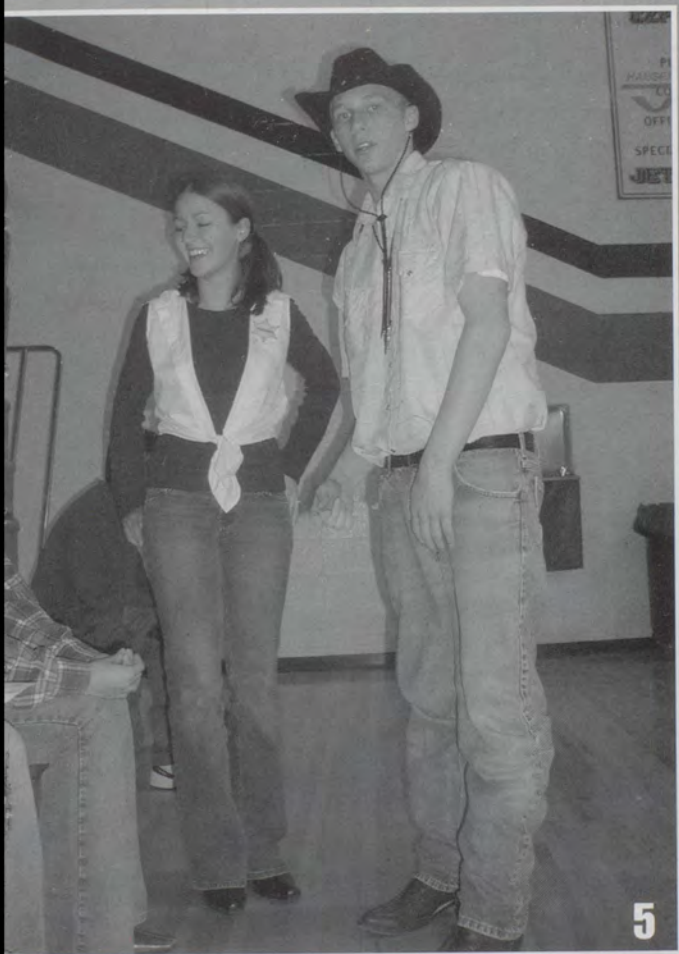




CAGE THE MOHAWKS!

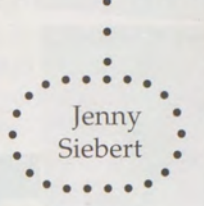

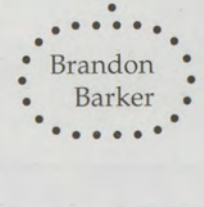

"I don't think the changes really made a difference, because the halls were still cool," Kenan Brod said.

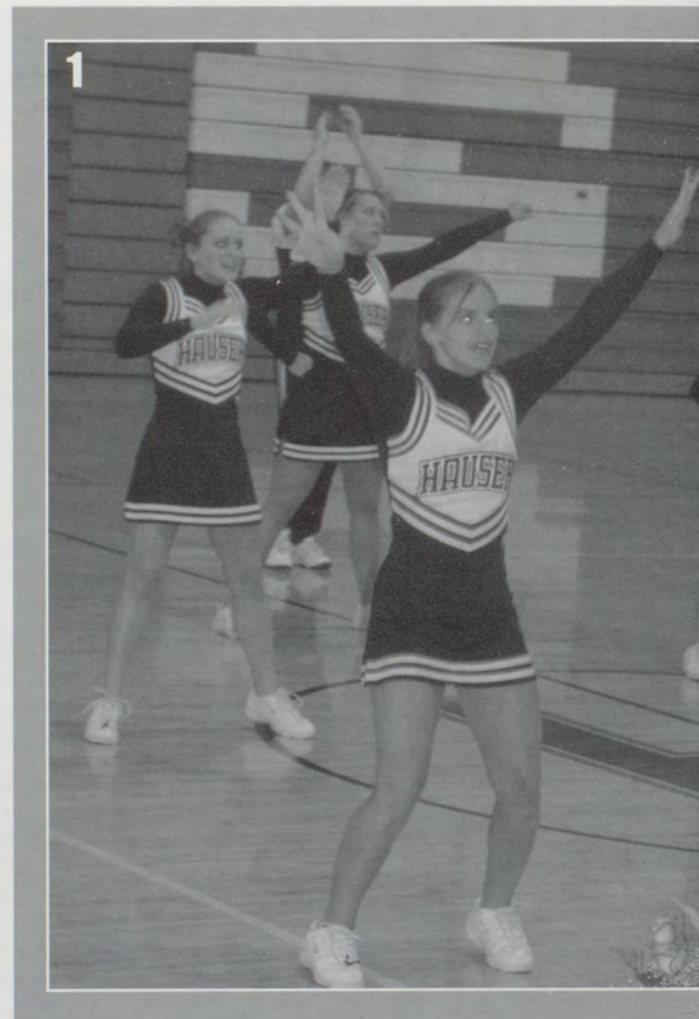
"Actually seeing the school spirit of each grade made the spirit chains a lot of fun," Josh Kuhn said.

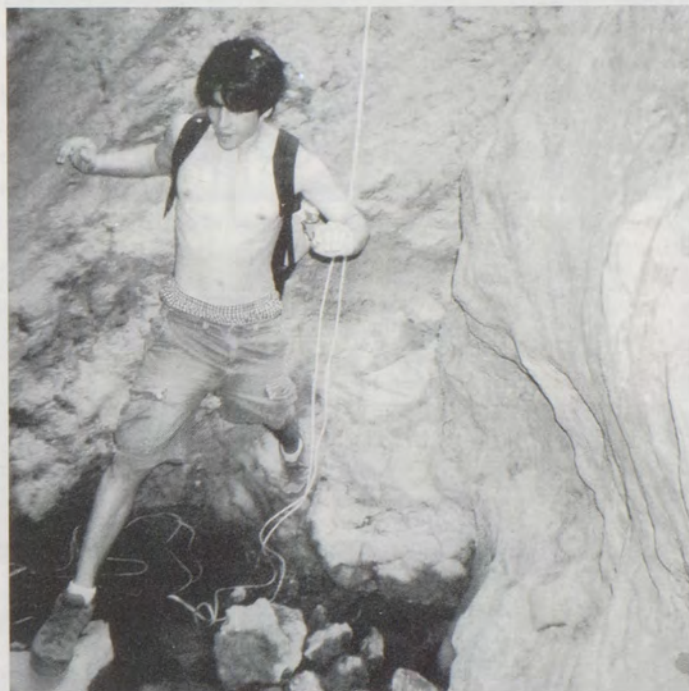


I BELIEVE I CAN FLY!!

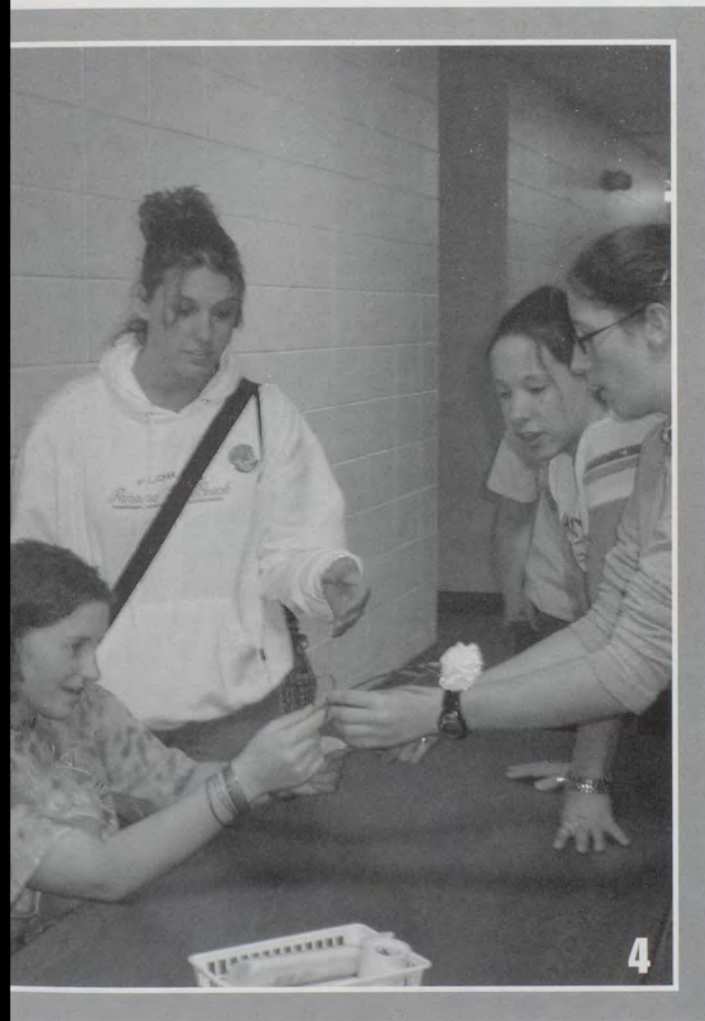

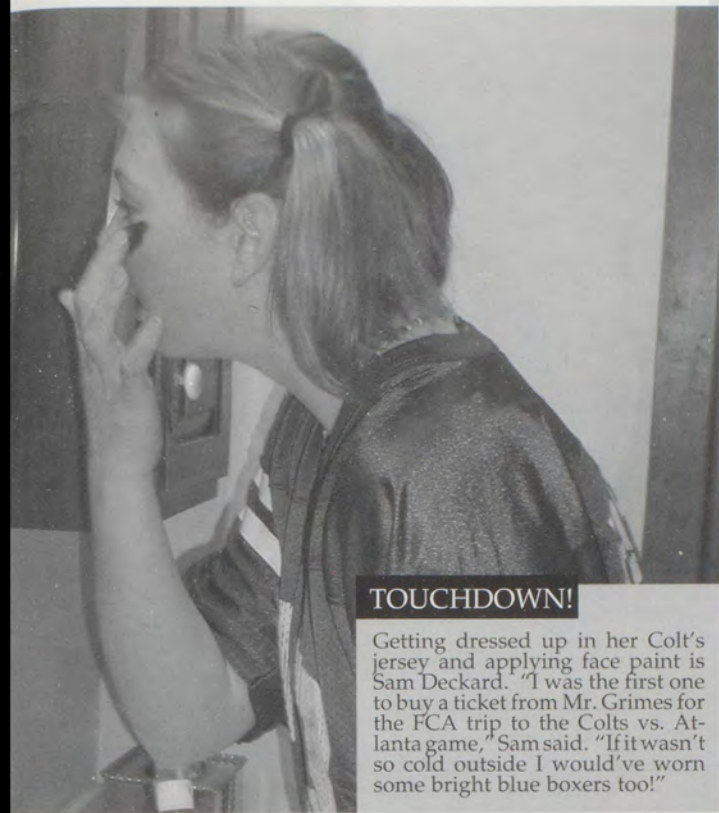

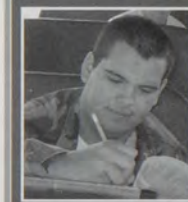

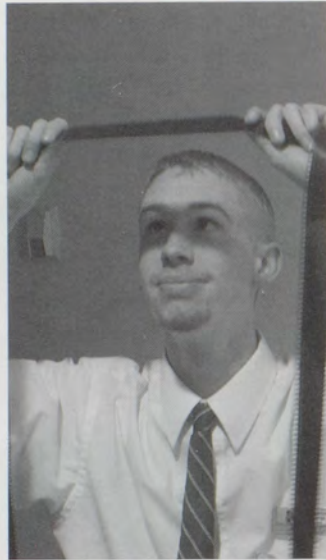


WHAT IS THAT MACHINE AGAIN?

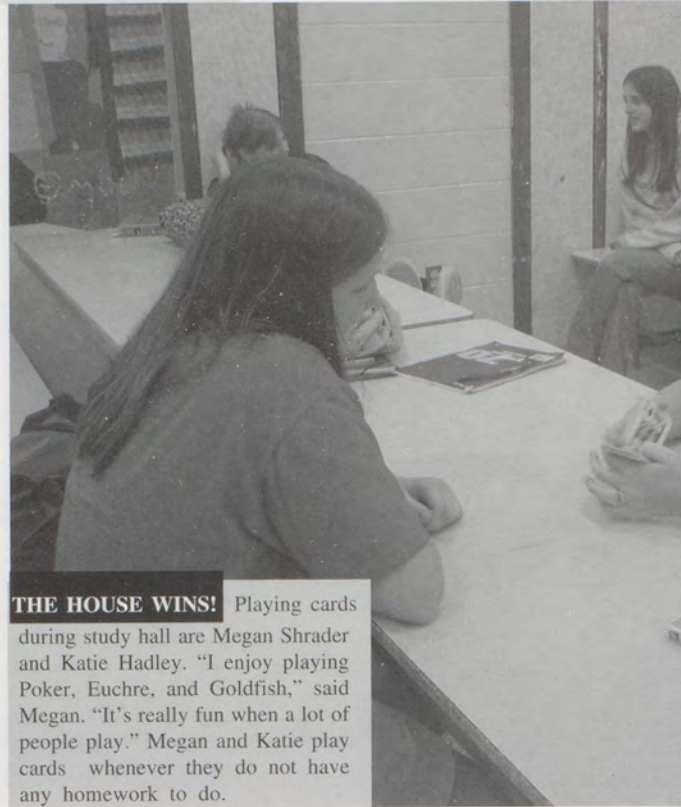

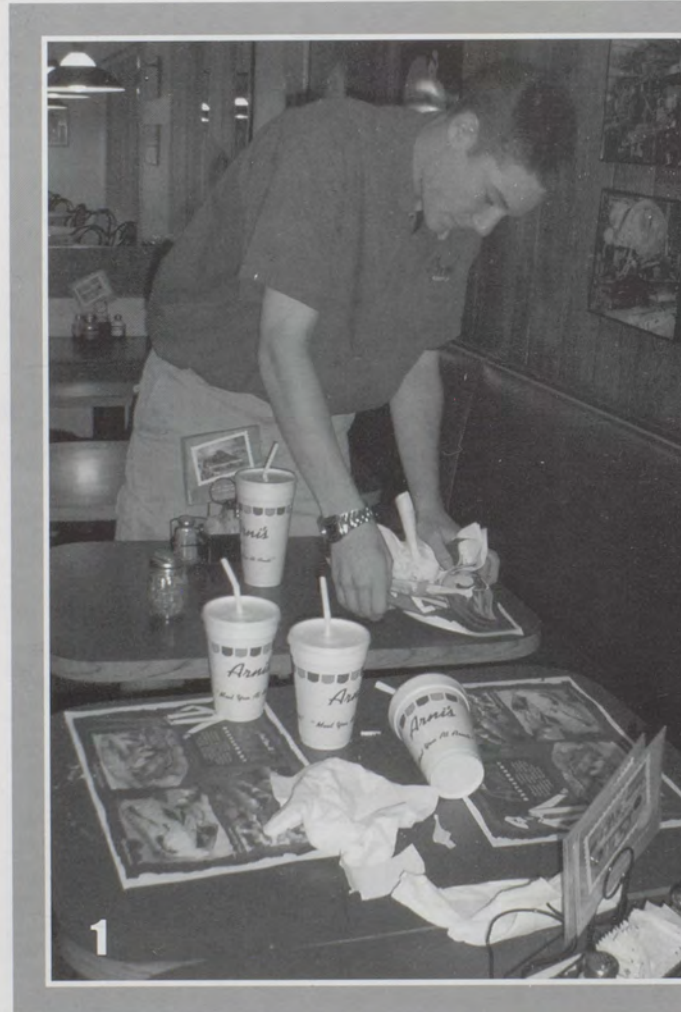

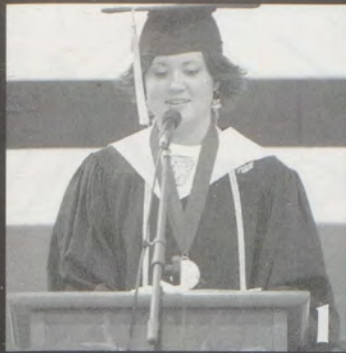

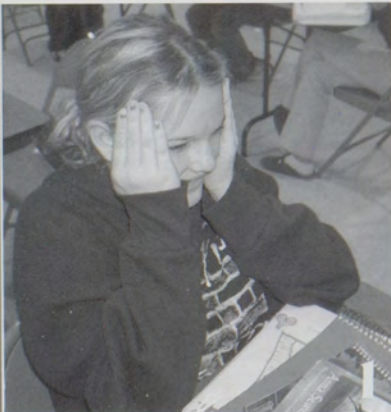
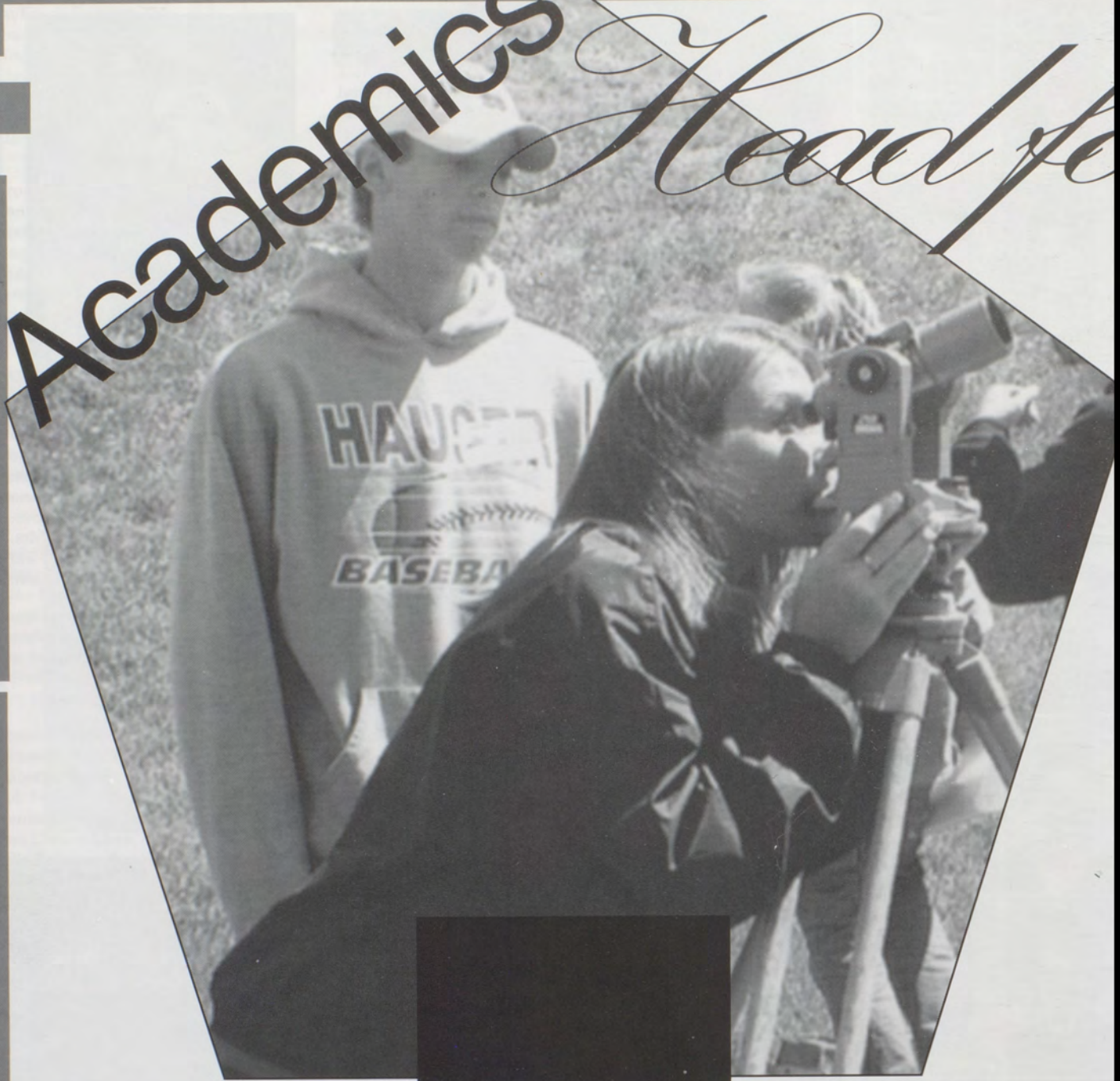
"I can't even begin to thank everyone who supported me,"

Sara Banta said, “When I think about how my education effects my future, I am driven to be successful at Hauser.”



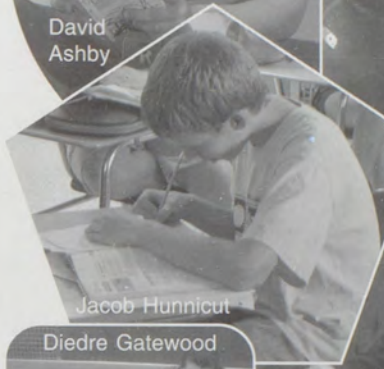

The physics class spent five weeks learning Newton's three Laws of Motion, culminating in a project that proved one of his laws. By pulling a table cloth out from under a plate and a cup, Jill Brinker proved Newton's 1st Law. "This proved that an object in motion stays in motion and an object at rest stays at rest," Jill said.

Labs and projects were useful to students in science. Bret Mize said, "Projects help me understand science because I can see the process in action."

Computer applications students used Word, PowerPoint, Publisher, and Excel. They also made a digital scrapbook about their life on the Powerpoint program.

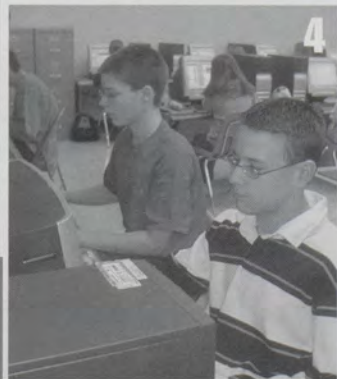
Ashley Edwards took computer applications. She said, "I really enjoyed the digital scrapbook because I can look at it in the future, since it is on a CD."

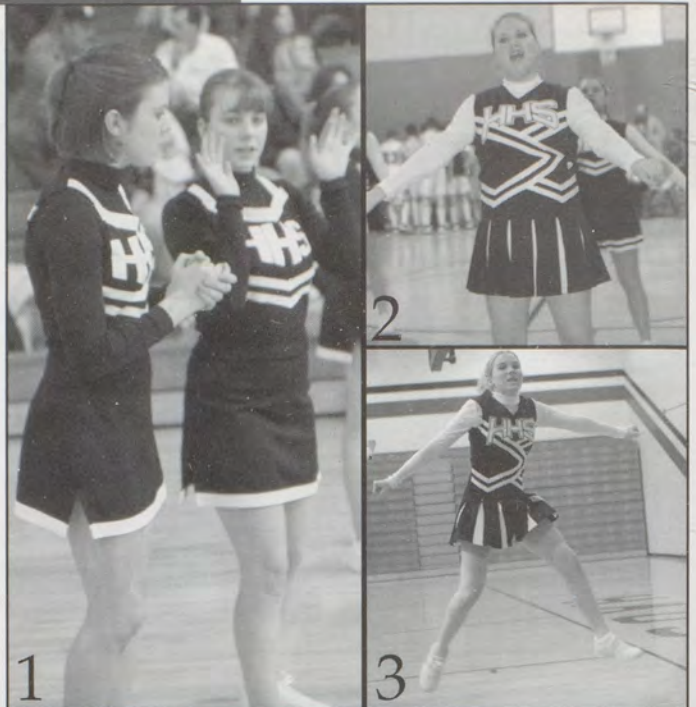

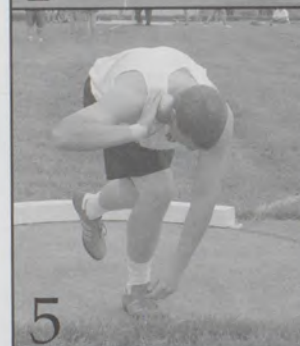

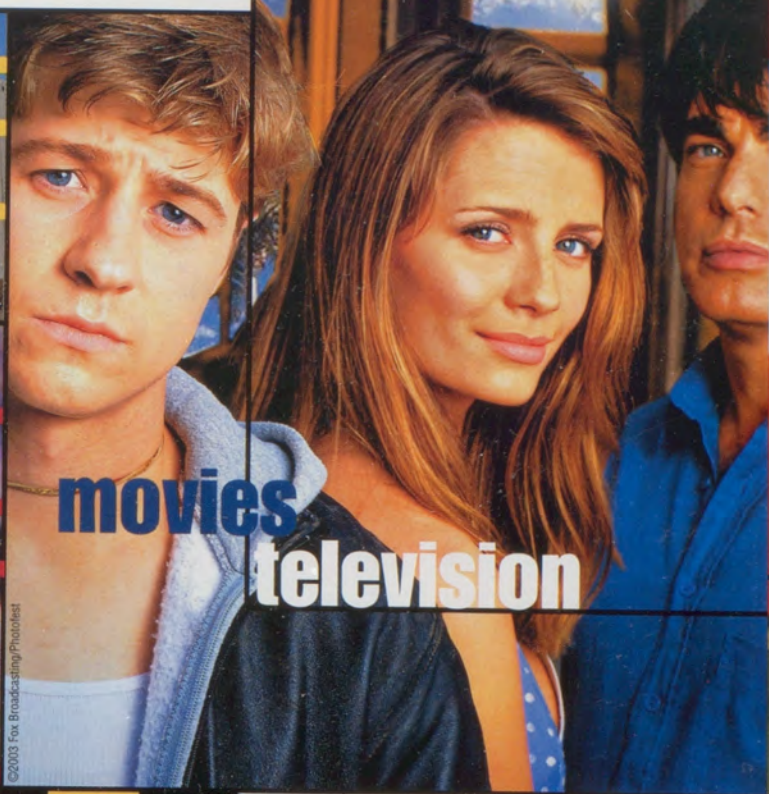
"Going to C4 class everyday and getting hands-on experience in my work area will really help me in the future. I guess you could say I'll be ahead of the game," Hannah Dingman said.

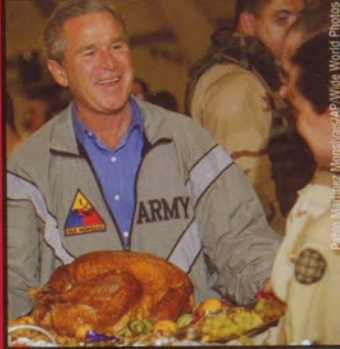

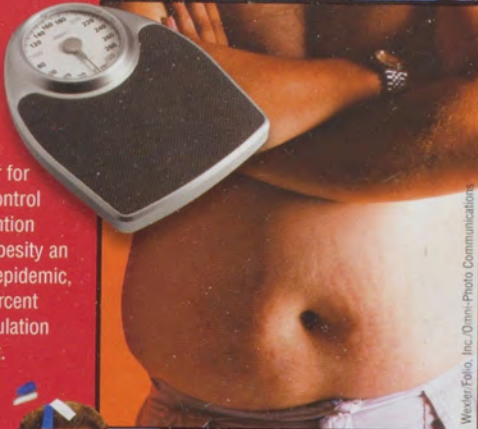

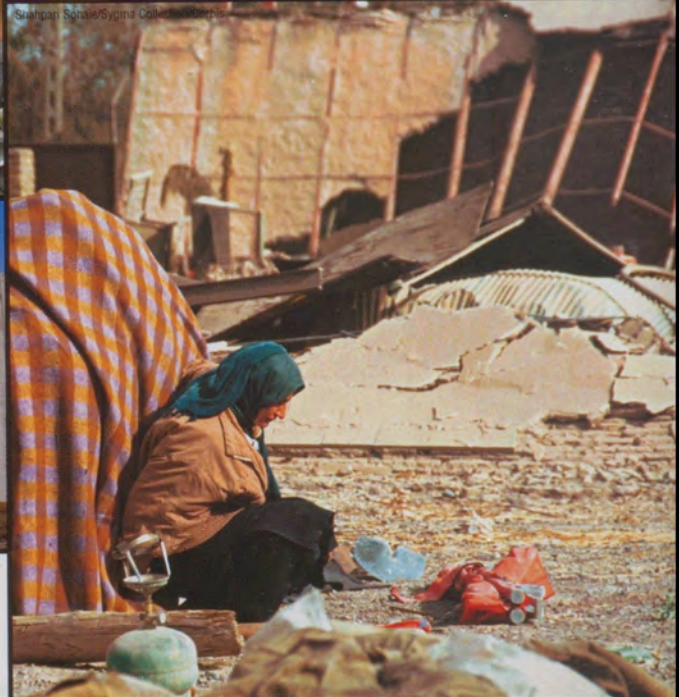

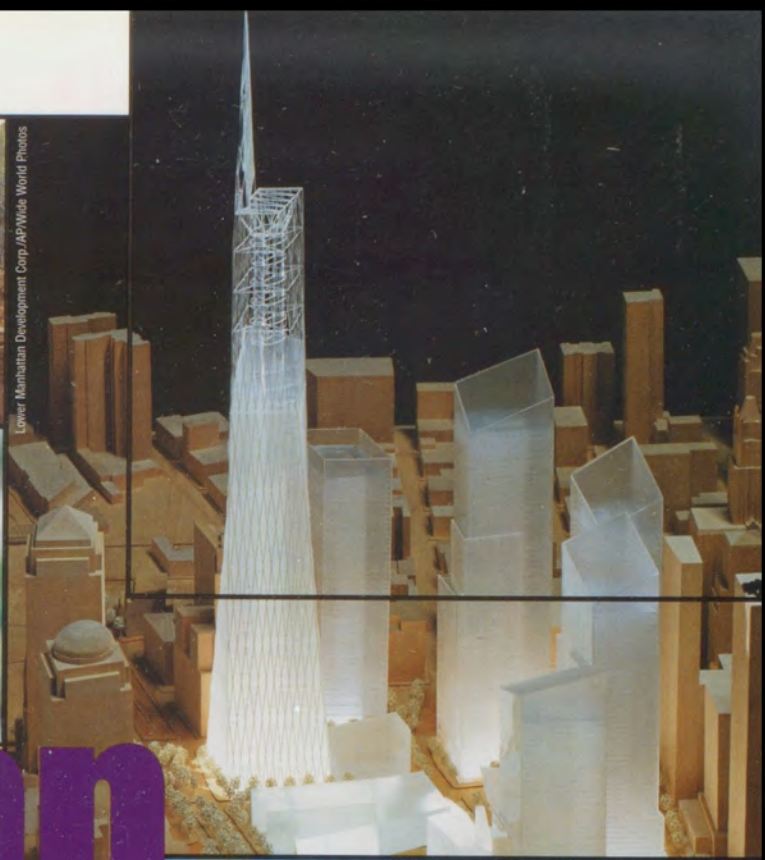

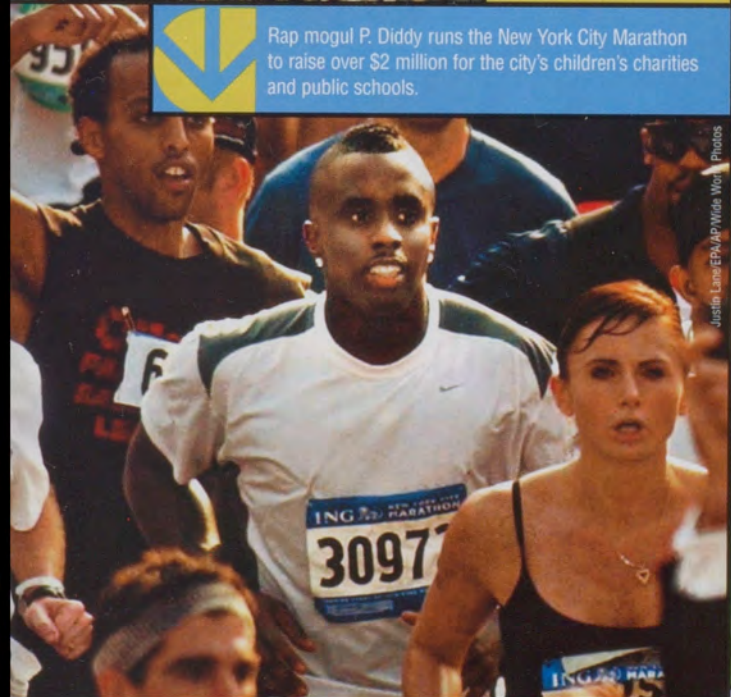

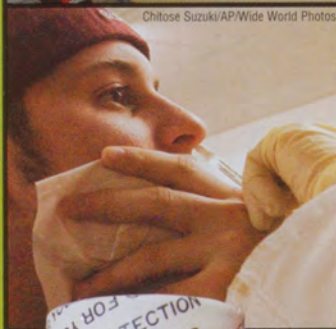

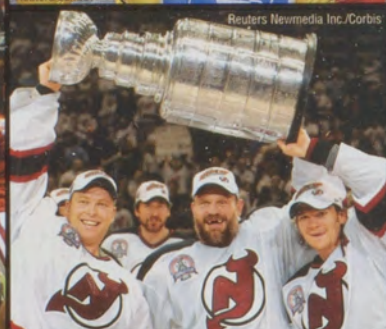

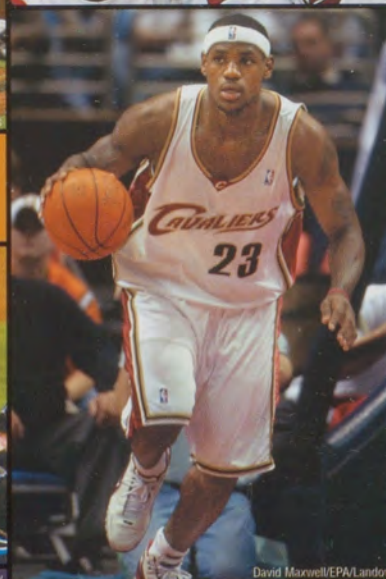

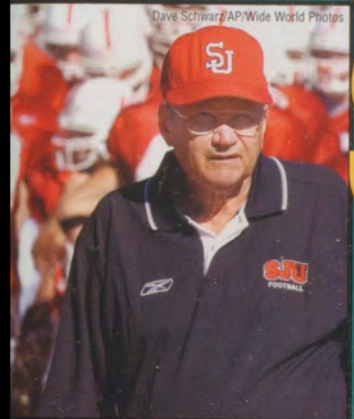
